

"FRAT" BOYS LOSE

School Board Rules Three Students Must Quit School. Their Parents Plead Cause for Them in Vain.

BLAKELY ADMITTED SON'S GUILT

Rigby and Brier Said Their Boys Had Resigned. Board Members Regretted Having to Take Drastic Action.

There was a solemn session of the Topeka board of education Monday night—caused by the presence of three fathers of high school students. They were there to plead with the board to permit their sons to continue in school.

Charles Blakely told the members of the board that his son Victor was guilty. "Of course, I would like to have him continue in school," Mr. Blakely said, "but I will not ask you to set aside school discipline."

The recommendations. Having stated their positions, the parents withdrew. When the report was called for by the teachers' committee, the following was a part of the recommendations:

"That James Brier, Victor Blakely and Fred Rigby, students in the high school, who have been affiliated with and participated in the meetings of the Kappa Alpha Pi fraternity, be expelled from school, and in the event that they do not, that they be hereby expelled from school."

In the discussion that followed and in the subsequent voting W. E. Atchison stood out for leniency. He first proposed that Fred Rigby's name be dropped from the report. Later he made the same motion concerning Victor Blakely.

Before a final vote was taken P. W. Griggs suggested that possibly the three who were "caught" might be let out of trouble should they inform upon others. "I don't believe this is the way done in dealing with criminals," said Griggs.

"Yes, but these boys are not criminals," replied the home from. While this phase of the situation was being discussed L. M. Penwell got on his feet.

"These boys have taken an oath. They will not tell upon the others and I admire them for it, and even if they would tell, for one would not be in favor of putting this board in the position of asking them to violate an oath. We would be asking them to do something which they could not do, and which I do not believe any member of this board would do."

"And even if these boys did tell on the others, they could come back to school," interjected Mr. C. J. Evans. "It would not be worth while for them to try it, on account of the reputation they would receive from the other students."

When the meeting adjourned, Penwell remarked to the other members of the board, "I have been at a meeting of this board with a heavier heart than I do tonight. I have had to vote against the wishes of some of my best friends."

"We all feel the same way," came in a chorus from the other members.

Topeka has had no directory since 1912. On two different occasions since 1912, R. L. Polk & Co. have sent men here to arrange for a directory, but have been obliged to give it up, on account of lack of interest and support.

"It is hoped," said a Topekan behind the plan, today, "that the merchants will realize the necessity of having a directory to the extent of making it possible, with their advertisements and subscriptions, for this support is absolutely necessary for the production of the book."

A TOPEKAN SOLVES IT

Policeman Hannon Invents Device to Prevent Stealing of Automobiles. A burglar alarm device for automobiles is the latest invention. A Topeka policeman, George G. Hannon, has just returned from Washington, D. C., where he secured a patent for his invention. Hannon has chased so many stolen automobiles that he decided to find something that would prevent this trouble so he invented a gong which will ring every time the car is started without the consent of the owner.

The invention was Mr. Hannon's own idea. Lee McGrath, Santa Fe electrician, and D. B. Hannon, brother of the policeman, of Washington, D. C., and his device, when in combination is set and the magneto key turned, runs the current from the magneto through itself, and establishes electric connection with a gong when an attempt is made to start the car without first releasing the combination. The owner of the car, knowing the combination, operates it the same as a safe combination when he wishes to start, releasing it before he switches on the magneto.
