STORE ROBBED AGAIN Breeman Mercantile Burglarized for Sixth Time in Three Years.

For the sixth time in the last three years the H. H. Breeman general mercantile store, three miles east of Kansas avenue on East Sixth street, was burglarized either late Wednesday night or early this morning. 
