







### SHRINERS COMING

Six Hundred Members of Abdallah Temple Expected.

Will Parade on Kansas Avenue at 1:30 Tuesday.

Six hundred nobles of Abdallah temple, A. A. O. N. M. S., will arrive tomorrow morning on a pilgrimage from Leavenworth at 10:30 o'clock. The party will be met by Marshall's band at the Santa Fe station and escorted to the Masonic temple where luncheon will be served by the ladies of the shrine.

At 1:30 o'clock there will be a parade, an oriental pageant, to be exact, on Kansas avenue, in which all the Shriners will take part, wearing flapping Arabic costumes and gaudy red fez. During the afternoon the class of novices will be initiated at the temple.

The ladies of the Shrine from Topeka and Leavenworth are to be at the Masonic temple between 2 and 3 o'clock, from there to attend a matinee at the Novelty. Mrs. T. C. Kirkpatrick, 1835 Folk street, is in charge. A banquet will be served at the Masonic temple at 6:30 to between 600 and 700 Shriners and their wives and ladies. The banquet is a very elaborate affair and has kept 20 people busy for the past two days. Camels carrying nuts are to be seen on the tables and there will be individual cakes for each guest in the shape of a red fez. The banquet hall has been so festooned with fall colors that it is impossible to see the ceiling. J. B. Doneyson is in charge of the banquet and Billy Bond is doing the catering. Following the big dinner will be given a program and during the evening the Santa Fe orchestra will play. A number on the program is a one-act farce called "The Union Depot."

### ALIEN LAW VOID

U. S. Court Holds Arizona Labor Measure Unconstitutional.

Foreigners Entitled to the Same Protection as Citizens.

Washington, Nov. 1.—The Arizona Anti-Allen labor law was today declared unconstitutional by the supreme court.

The supreme court's decision affirms the decision of a special circuit court which also held the law unconstitutional. Much attention was attracted to the case because several foreign governments had protested against the law and because of its similarity to the land legislation in California which restricts the ownership of real estate by Japanese. While not exactly like the California situation many lawyers have looked forward to the Arizona decision for what view the highest court might take of the California law if it ever got into litigation.

Jurors in "Father Black" Tragedy Tell of Catholic Paper.

Houston, Tex., Nov. 1.—After jurymen had testified to seeing copies of an anti-Catholic newspaper in the jury room, a new trial was ordered today at Marshall in the case of Mrs. John Rogers, against whom a verdict was returned in her suit for \$3,000 accident insurance for the death of her husband, who met death when William Black, an anti-Catholic lecturer, was killed here last February.

In a field nearby Morris shot himself through the head. He used two pistols.
