

SHE STOPPED 'EM

Chicago Woman Submarines Asylum Negro Sensation. Sister Prevents Girls From Signing New Warrants. TAKE NO ACTION ON CRUELTY County Will Leave Other Charges to Board Control. Two More Girls May Be Called In on Case.

The boat of prosecution, launched by the office of W. E. Atchison, county attorney, came near being submerged late Tuesday evening when a new character, a Mrs. Hildebrand, sister of Thelma and Irma Grant, who lives in Chicago, appeared in the case at the county attorney's office and persuaded her sisters temporarily to cease swearing to warrants against attendants at the institution. The woman made her appearance during an inquisition in the county attorney's office. Irma Grant had just sworn to a complaint charging another man, newly implicated, with a statutory offense. Will Anderson, court stenographer, had just drawn up two other complaints for the girls to sign and the girls were preparing to sign them when the woman plowed through the cordon of county officials through the outer office and into the star chamber of the county attorney.

preliminary examination of Arthur Davenport was set this morning for this afternoon at 2 o'clock in the court of Topeka, in order to be sure of obtaining the complaining witnesses' testimony.

J. J. Schenck, it is understood, will defend Davenport, who it is alleged wrote love letters to the Grant girls under the name of Harry Gordon. County officials fear that the attitude of the Chicago woman will prevent them from obtaining more warrants in the case.

Persuasion was tried without success upon the two girls and their champion last night by the county officials to get one of the girls to sign the complaints. Several times the girl was nearly persuaded, officials say, but just at the critical moment the sister would object and the fees of the county officials would fall with a crash.

Too Many Complaints. There is no doubt whatever in the mind of county officials that the Hadley girl who testified against Dan Turner in the court of Topeka will stick to her testimony. According to officials, the sister of the Grant girls did not have much objection to the two girls' swearing to one complaint each, but insisted that it would be too much for them to sign more than one.

Star chamber inquisitions are being held every few hours in the county attorney's office. This afternoon, two other girls, said to know something about the alleged orgies at the institution, will be called before the county attorney and more warrants will probably be issued.

Testify as to Brutality. That some of the attendants at the hospital were brutal to patients was the allegation made by some of the girls in the county attorney's office Tuesday evening, in an inquisition that lasted until after 9 o'clock. The Hadley girl claimed that while she was in the buildings at the hospital she gave patients notes to take to the hospital officials. Certain attendants, she said, took the notes away from the patients and cuffed and struck them. So far three arrests have been made in the scandal. Other arrests and other warrants may follow at any time.

The county attorney's office will not take up the allegations that attendants are cruel to patients but will leave the matter in the hands of the board of control which is making a state investigation of other girls.


