**NO LIQUOR ON TRAINS** Denver and Rio Grande to Kick J. Barlycorn Off.

Denver, Nov. 23.—The sale of intoxicants upon all Denver & Rio Grande railroad trains will cease after January 1, 1916, when Colorado becomes dry territory, according to a statement of H. W. McAbee, superintendent of dining car service of the railroad, given out today.

The order, it was said, will apply not only to Colorado, but to trains operating in Utah and New Mexico, which are not prohibition states.

**NO LABELED WIDOWS** Charitable Bodies Oppose "Tag Day" for Chicago Relicts.

Chicago, Nov. 23.—Charitable organizations of Chicago today began active opposition to a council order passed last night permitting a "tag day" for widows December 14, the widows themselves to do the tagging.

Mayor Thompson was asked to veto the order on the ground that it would promote beggary and expose to jokes and insults women who appeared on the streets labeled "widows" and soliciting funds.

## IN 3-MILE LIMIT

The Zealandia Was in Neutral Port When Searched.

U. S. Will Demand an Apology From Great Britain.

Washington, Nov. 23.—The United States will demand an apology from Great Britain for the searching of the American steamer Zealandia by a British warship within the three-mile limit of Progreso harbor, Yucatan. It also will call for a disavowal of the act with the promise that it will not happen again.

The action of this government will be based upon the report of Commander D. E. Dismukes, of the battleship Kentucky and of John Gorman, American consul at Progreso. They asserted in reports received at the state department today that the Zealandia was boarded within the neutral waters of Mexico.

State department officials declared this is the first case in which undisputed facts have given this government the clear right and at the same time obligation to act definitely and decisively. It is thought that upon the publications of the facts Great Britain will voluntarily disavow the act.

The reports of Commander Dismukes and Consul Gorman were made at the direct orders of the state department. The British embassy here informed the state department that it had been advised by the commander of the warship that searched the Zealandia that the vessel was boarded outside the three-mile zone of Progreso harbor.

The captain of the Zealandia made an affidavit that the search took place well within the three-mile limit. This contradictory testimony caused Secretary Lansing to ask the navy department to send a warship to Progreso to investigate and also to call upon Consul Gorman to make further inquiry. Their reports today cleared the matter up entirely so far as this government is concerned.

It was stated that the United States is convinced that the search was within the three-mile limit and was therefore illegal as it violated the neutrality of Mexico.

## READY FOR TROUBLE

Ambulances and Hospital Tent at Fair Ground Races.

The ambulance, medical and hospital corps for the Thanksgiving auto races at the Topeka Fair grounds are being selected today. The ambulance will be near the track, ready for service if needed, and a hospital tent will be erected tomorrow. A number of experienced and competent physicians will be at hand.

This may seem a stoical anticipation of trouble but it is just the opposite and is a part of the auto racing game. "We don't want any accidents and hope always to escape them, but we know what is going to happen with six or eight high-powered cars whirling around a track at lightning speed, so our plan is to be prepared for emergencies. If accidents should happen and we had made no preparation for it we would be rightfully censured," said Promoter C. A. Peterson this morning. "The dangers are too great and track accidents are too common for us not to take every precaution."

Mr. Peterson announced that H. S. Putney, a well known local automobilist, will be the starter for the races, and the judges, timekeepers and scorers will be chosen today.

Tickets for the races are on sale at Stansfield's drug store, and as there will be but one admission gate, those wishing to avoid the rush at the grounds may buy their tickets now down town. Park space for automobiles may also be reserved at Stansfield's in order to keep the crowds away from the fences along the turns, the grand stand and bleachers will be free and just one admission charge will be made.

Marshall's band has been engaged for the afternoon, and will give a concert before and during the races. This will be an additional feature, as Marshall's always helps draw a crowd.

A number of local "speed demons" are contemplating entering the contests, which are open to all comers. The purses for the day aggregate \$1,000, and the chief event of the day will be a twenty-five mile race with several other races preceding it.

## Roads Lose Lumber Rate Fight.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Cancellation of the application of rates of the Atchafalaya & Southern and other railroads on lumber for sash, doors and blinds in carloads from Oklahoma City, Okmulgee, and other points in Oklahoma and from Shreveport and other points in Louisiana, to points in Texas, was found not justified today by the interstate commerce commission. Proposed carload rates on sash, doors and blinds from Oklahoma City and other points in Oklahoma to points in Texas, also were held unjustified.

AT THE COMMERCIAL CLUB.

Secretary Kelley is looking for some one to be a delegate to the conference of the National Security league, which will be held in that city on that date.
