U. S. TO CURB LIE

ARMY PLAN LIKE SWISS

Chairman Chamberlain Working on Bill for National Military Service.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Chairman Chamberlain of the senate military committee announced today that he planned to introduce a bill for national military service modeled after the Swiss system. He does not expect it will be passed, but plans to bring the subject up for serious consideration in congress and to begin a campaign for military education.

Senator Chamberlain and Chairman Hay of the house military committee, officers of the general staff and Secretary Garrison will confer this week on the army appropriation program. They expect to have it ready for introduction during the first week of the session.

Republican Leader Mann of the house today accepted President Wilson's invitation to confer on national defense legislation. Senator Gallinger, the senate leader, already had accepted.

ORDER FOR 8,000 FISH

Commissioner Porter Will Seine Gage Park Lakes to Fill It.

The city of Topeka is today attempting to fill an order for 8,000 goldfish. If W. L. Porter, city commissioner of parks, is able to seine that many fish out of the ponds in Gage park, they will be sold to the city in Manhattan which has several racket stores in the state. The fish will be sold in the stores, but unless 8,000 can be secured, none are wanted.

When the commissioner of parks began selling goldfish last fall, he estimated the number for sale at one million. Later he lowered his estimate to 250,000. Several thousand have been sold, but the order from Manhattan is the largest and one of the first making it necessary to get a seine. No one knows, even approximately, how many fish are in the Gage park lakes.

WHISKY IN A COFFIN

Casket Company Manager Acquitted; Shipping Clerk Guilty.

Chattanooga, Nov. 23.—T. C. Betterton, manager of the Tennessee Coffin company and police commissioner of the city, today was found not guilty in a court of shipping whisky into adjoining states without proper branding of packages.

A verdict of guilty was returned against the company and Frank Fox, shipping clerk.

The government charged whisky had been shipped in caskets from the Tennessee Coffin company. Betterton denied any knowledge of such practices.

BISHOP MOORE FELL

Methodist Prelate Is Believed Stricken With Paralysis.

Cincinnati, Nov. 23.—Bishop David D. Moore of the Methodist Episcopal church was taken to a hospital here today suffering from what appeared to be a paralytic stroke.

Bishop Moore was returning to his home here from a visit to his brother in Chicago, after having recently visited the Pacific coast. He was on the train when stricken.

The attending physician admitted that his condition is serious.

Edward H. Noyes Dead.

Chicago, Nov. 23.—Edward H. Noyes, for fifty years a member of the Chicago board of trade, died suddenly today in the office of the secretary of the organization.

WOMEN FOR STEWARDS

Trans-Atlantic Liner St. Paul Anticipates British Conscription.

New York, Nov. 23.—Women stewards will replace men on the American liner on its next trip from Liverpool to New York. William Reed, chief steward, announced today on the liner's arrival that all unmarried stewards will be discharged when the vessel arrives at Liverpool in its return voyage. This move is in anticipation of possible British conscription.

Issue of \$20,000 From Rush County Approved by State Auditor.

The first rural high school bonds to be approved by the state auditor under the 1915 act were accepted today when Rush county filed an issue for a \$20,000 building. The bonds were issued by the high school district No. 1, Rush county.

Recently the supreme court upheld the legality of the rural high school act as shown by a writ of mandamus to compel the auditor to register bonds under the terms of the law. The decision was handed down early this month. Rush county was the first to come under provisions of the law and certify its bonds to W. E. Davis, state auditor.

Issue of \$38,000 internal improvement bonds were filed today by Clay Center. The money will be used for paving.

Missouri Railroads Get Time.

Springfield, Mo., Nov. 23.—The Missouri public service commission made an order today postponing the date railroads must accept rates for a period of twenty days. The rates will be effective, if accepted, about February 1, instead of January 1.
