**WANTS MORE MONEY**

Nurse of Dope Fiend Declines to Accept Pay Offer by the City.

Mary Brennan refuses to accept a city warrant issued to her for her services in taking care of a "dope fiend" at the city jail. She wants the money all right but she declares the amount offered is not sufficient and states that she will not accept it.

Mrs. Brennan was selected by Dr. A. B. Jeffrey to nurse a negro woman who was addicted to the drug habit and who was being treated at the expense of the city. Dr. Jeffrey agreed that she was to receive \$15 a week. But there was some misunderstanding and Mrs. Brennan wants \$30 a week.

Dr. Jeffrey put me down with that horrible colored person in the worst kind of surroundings," said Mrs. Brennan this morning. "I stayed there night and day for over four days and now they want to pay me a little over six dollars for my services. No woman would think of doing that kind of work for that kind of money—working night and day. I know I wouldn't and I am not going to."

Mrs. Brennan appealed to Mayor J. E. House and to Commissioner W. L. Porter.

"The mayor told me he did not think that was enough money," said Mrs. Brennan.

Commissioner Porter told Mrs. Brennan that Dr. Jeffrey could pay her whatever he wanted to but that the city was liable only for the amount called for by the warrant.
