Porto Ricans Send Governor to Appeal to Congress. Declare Were Promised Citizenship 17 Years Ago. TAXED BY U. S. BUT NO VOICE. Bills Already Are Before House and Senate. Provide "Blanket Citizenship" and Home Rule.

New York, Jan. 3.—Arthur Yager, governor of Porto Rico, arrived here today on the steamship Carolina from San Juan on his way to Washington to urge congress to pass an organic act granting American citizenship to Porto Ricans. Governor Yager says he expects to spend three or four weeks in Washington before returning to Porto Rico.

San Juan, Porto Rico, Jan. 3.—Whether Porto Ricans are to be successful this year in winning the United States citizenship is the question uppermost in the minds of most Porto Ricans at present. Although citizenship has been granted since the days of the Spanish-American war and American occupation, seventeen years ago, each congress since that time has failed to pass the necessary laws. The islanders are now hopeful that the first Democratic administration since 1893 will act favorably and give them a definite political status. At present Porto Ricans are merely "citizens of Porto Rico."

In the hope that favorable legislation may be obtained, Governor Arthur Yager will spend the month of January in Washington urging congress to act. Bills providing a new organic act to take the place of the temporary Foraker act, which went into force in 1893 establishing civil government and which has been in force ever since, have already been introduced in congress by Chairman Jones of the house committee on insular affairs and by Senator Willard Saulsbury of Delaware.

The new organic act should grant the people of Porto Rico collective citizenship in the United States, said Governor Yager. "It is the necessary complement of sovereignty and should go with the flag. The people of Porto Rico must obey all the laws of the United States, pay taxes, are liable to military service, and yet they are not citizens."

Leading Party for Home Rule. The chief features of the bills to be considered by congress, it is expected here, will provide both for blanket citizenship and a greater degree of home rule. The most important home rule feature is the provision for an elective senate of nineteen members. The present lower house of the legislature is already elected already by the upper house or senate is composed of eleven members, all of whom are appointed by the president of the United States, and six of whom are heads of executive departments of the insular government.

FOR CHURCH UNITY

Protestant Denominations Plan World Conference. Would Bring All Christian Religions Into One Body.

New York, Jan. 3.—Plans for a world conference of churches to consider the question of church unity will be discussed at a meeting of representatives of the Protestant churches of North America to begin tomorrow in the Episcopal cathedral of the Incarnation at Garden City, Long Island. About twenty million communicants of Christian churches, including those of Canada, will be represented in the deliberations. The purpose of this conference is not to negotiate for the union, it is announced, but to consider how the Protestant churches of North America might make united plans for a world conference on faith and order.

The Rev. Dr. Julius B. Remensnyder of this city, formerly president of the Lutheran general synod, has been selected to deliver an address, outlining the basis on which the Christian churches may be united. His statement will be followed by addresses by an Episcopalian, a Presbyterian, a Baptist and a Methodist. "What we want to do is to compare notes and find precisely where we stand," said Dr. Remensnyder today. The conference will be opened by the Rev. Dr. Newman Smyth of New Haven, Conn. Plans for a world conference to the meeting are Bishops Anderson of Chicago, Welley of Fond du Lac, Chicago, and Philadelphia, Dr. T. Manning and Bishop Greer of this city.

Catholics May Join. It was said today that a decision as to whether the Roman Catholic and Greek Catholic churches may send delegates to the proposed world conference depends in a large part on the outcome of the visit to the pope at Rome and the Greek patriarchs at Constantinople, which cannot be made until after the war.
