IN GOOD SHOWING

Topeka Food Establishments Score Well in Inspection.

Forty-Five Between 90 and 100 With Blue Cards.

Twenty-two per cent of the restaurants, groceries, drug stores and other places where food is sold in Topeka score within ten per cent of perfect. Of the 219 places inspected by the city food inspection department, under the direction of Dr. L. W. Rowles, forty-five score between 90 and 100 per cent, thus drawing blue cards to place in their windows.

This is the showing made by the first monthly report issued by the food inspection department and is widely different from the report issued a little more than a month ago by the state food inspector.

Places scoring from 90 to 100 per cent drew blue cards, those scoring from 75 to 90 per cent drew white cards and those below 75 per cent drew red cards. There were only six places in the red card class. The remaining 159 establishments drew white cards.

The inspections were made by Earl Harne, inspector for the city, and he spent the entire month on the job. He has a regular system of scoring. Dr. Rowles expects the next report to make a much better showing. Immediately following the inspection by Mr. Harne the store falling below standard took steps to conform with

the regulation of the department. The following list of places inspected shows the score made by each and the class in which each comes:

GEN. MARTIN INVITED

Topekan Will Head Navy League Delegation From Kansas.

Washington, D. C., March 2.—Gen. C. I. Martin, of Topeka, Kansas, has been asked by the Navy League of the United States to head a delegation to its National Defense convention, which is to be held at Washington April 13-14, inclusive, according to an announcement made today at national headquarters of the league. The convention will be attended by delegates from every state and is expected to bring about a concentration of the best thought of the country on preparedness that will show the just what is needed for protection.

Leading members of the league in every section of the United States are now making plans to attend the convention and to participate in its sessions. The letter sent by the league to Mr. Martin, asking for his co-operation, points out that the plan now being developed will make this convention a civilian's post-graduate in national defense.

The convention is to be held in the New Willard hotel. Most of the fourth day, April 13, will be spent on a visit to the United States naval academy at Annapolis. Facilities will be afforded the delegates to see the classes at work in the great school where naval officers are trained.
