Grady Family Has Come to Live on North Side

While Its Head Is Chasing Villa in Mexico.

WRECK ON THE UNION PACIFIC

Seven Freight Cars Derailed on the Cutoff.

Departure of the Motor Delayed Until This Morning.

There is one family in North Topeka that has more than a casual interest in the trouble between the United States and Mexico. It is the family of Joseph Grady, who moved this week to the house at 1325 North Kansas avenue. Grady is at present an officer in the Seventh cavalry which left for the interior of Mexico last Wednesday. On November 25, Grady with his family of a wife and three children, sailed from Manila, P. I., arriving in San Francisco on December 15. His company was ordered to Douglas, Ariz., and Grady sent his wife and children to Topeka where Mrs. Grady's mother lives. Mrs. Grady received a letter yesterday from her husband, and had it would probably be three months before they get back to the United States. Grady has twenty-five years of service to his country. He joined the army at the age of seventeen and will have thirty years of active service, having earned part of it in double time in the islands.

Allice Grady, the oldest child, a girl of six years old, has crossed the Pacific four times, and is fluent in Spanish and English. Joseph, Jr., born in Manila, and a baby girl have crossed three times. Grady has served in the Philippines, in Cuba, and in the Philippines. Mrs. Grady before her marriage lived in North Topeka, and is a daughter of Mrs. Alice Hall.
