AT HOME NEWS

Mrs. Patrick Walsh has been granted permission to make a \$1,000 addition to her dwelling at 507 Polk street, by the fire marshal.

One hundred and fifty-seven alarms have been received by the fire department this year. This is 46 more than were received to date, last year.

A telephone call from 1319 Polk street called the fire department to the barn owned by John McBea in the rear of his premises. Rubbish had caused a small blaze which resulted in a loss of \$50.

An amendment was offered by the city attorney at the meeting of the city commissioners this morning, to the ordinance governing shows and amusements, such as circuses and traveling attractions, which places a license tax of \$1,500 on all such shows that attempt to show in Topeka on Labor Day or during the state fair week. It further stipulates that the license tax must be paid before the show unloads.

Many Topeka bankers will go to Salina next week to attend the twenty-ninth annual convention of the Kansas Bankers' association on May 11 and 12. It is hoped that the convention can be brought here next year.

W. F. Benson, state bank commissioner, and C. S. Elliott of Topeka are scheduled to make addresses. Programs containing pictures of numerous state bankers have been sent to members of the association this week.

Mrs. Ruby M. Bradley advised the city commissioners this morning that she had sustained injuries, by slipping on the ice in front of the building occupied by the Provident association, December 27, last, and as a result she had been to considerable expense, and asked that they settle her claim without litigation. As her claim was presented after four months had expired, it is stated, she has no claim against the city. The matter was referred to the city attorney and Commissioner Tandy.

NEXT WEEK'S FORECAST
Plains States Will Have Thunder Showers Latter Portion.

Washington, May 6.—The weather bureau's forecast for the week beginning May 7, shows:

During the coming week temperatures above the seasonal average are indicated for the middle Atlantic, south Atlantic and Gulf states, the middle plains states and the great central valleys. Moderate temperatures are probably in the region of the great lakes, while in the northern plains states, the Rocky mountain and plateau regions and the Pacific states, temperatures will average below the seasonal normal. A change to considerably lower temperatures will overspread the northwestern states, the northern Rocky mountain region and the north Pacific states Tuesday or Wednesday and will be attended by local frosts in this region.

An extensive area of low pressure that now covers the northwestern states and western Canadian provinces will advance slowly eastward, reaching the middle west by the middle of the week and the eastern states the latter part of the week. It will cause unsettled weather and local showers during the next several days in the region of the great lakes, the upper Mississippi valley, the northwestern states and the northern Pacific states.

By the middle of the week, local showers and thunder storms are probable over the great central valleys and the plains states and the latter part of the week in the middle Atlantic states and throughout the south.

The weather will be generally fair the first half of the week throughout the southern states and the great central valley.


AN ENGLISH COTTAGE. DESIGN NO. D-1365.

This beautiful type that has for its motif the Old English, is modernized sufficiently to meet the requirements of the average housekeeper, and will make a beautiful home, even without the magnificent ivy which the picture of the exterior shows clambering up its walls and chimney.

The plan suggested for this exterior is quite a spacious one, as will be seen. Three bedrooms upon the ground floor, and a bathroom, but if one building this does not desire the splendid large owner's bed chamber, with private bath and dressing room off of it, a beautiful apartment can be made by taking all the space of the two front rooms, and the bedroom wall for this purpose, leaving bath as it is, and using rear left hand corner bedroom for dressing room, and this could well be done for there are three very nice bed chambers on the second floor, and by putting a little dormer in the rear roof, the room marked for "storage" would make a splendid bathroom for the second floor.

The exterior of the entire house is stucco, but cobblestones have been used in most effective fashion for the porch railing and massive outside chimney; the latter being almost always a distinctive feature of the English cottage. The gray plaster of the exterior, framed by a brown oak stained wood effect for the wood trimmings, and a soft moss green or dull faded red for the roof shingles will make a most effective color combination for this design.

Total width, 47 feet 6 inches, not including chimney projection; total depth, right hand wing, 34 feet 6 inches.
