READY FOR T. R. MERCY FOR ORPET

Standpatters in Central Kansas Willing to Accept Him.

W. N. Hawley of Herington Sees a Remarkable Change.

MEN WHO FOUGHT HIM IN 1912

Now are Boosting for Nomination of the Colonel.

They Look Upon Him as the Only Sure Winner.

Central Kansas Republicans—they of the old standpat school in politics—are anxious or ready to accept Roosevelt as the nominee of the Republican national convention in Chicago in June. That sentiment is found in many counties in the central portion of the state according to W. N. Hawley, a widely known and wealthy Herington lumberman and banker. Hawley owns a string of lumber yards and banking interests in central Kansas and his statement in Topeka today was based on conditions in a number of these localities.

One of the surprising situations in the pre-convention presidential contest is the wonderful change of sentiment among the standpatters. Hawley declares. The Herington banker naturally assumes that the Progressives and many Roosevelt's loyal supporters of four years ago are for him at this time. But the graduates of the old school in Kansas politics—hardly. Now Hawley is seeing the strange spectacle in politics—the spectacle of men who fought and swore at the Roosevelt cause in 1912, boosting for the Roosevelt nomination.

Remarkable Awakening.

"There is a strange awakening of the old Roosevelt sentiment all through the central counties of the state," said Hawley. "It has been steadily growing for some weeks. Now it is becoming crystallized and most positive. To me it has been one of the real features of the pre-convention campaign.

"It isn't the mere appearance of this sentiment for T. R. it is something else. It is the character of the men who are behind it. It is the willingness of former obstinate standpatters to accept Roosevelt as the Republican nominee. In many localities it is even a demand for his nomination. Scores of standpatters of my acquaintance if not outwardly and openly for Roosevelt are ready and willing to accept him and quietly express their positive sentiment. It is a growing feeling. I believe that Roosevelt is the only man in which the party can place an absolute confidence and hope of success.

The swing of former T. R. opponents to the colonel's banner is to the Herington man one of the significant features of the campaign.

Father of Marion Lambert Pleads for Slayer.

Willing to Take Part of Blame on Own Shoulders.

MURDERED GIRL ONLY CHILD; HOME LONESOME NOW.

Old Couple Would Adopt a Daughter "Like Marion."

Waukegan, Ill., May 18.—The yawning vacancy in the home of Frank Lambert, the simple Lake Forest gardener whose daughter, Marion, was found dead after another here, woods one bleak day of last February, is soon to be filled. Mr. and Mrs. Lambert are now seeking for another child to take the place of Marion, but they are a lonely old couple and they dread the long years that are coming and an empty house and nothing but haunting memory to fill their hearts and minds.

Lambert strolled out of the court room yesterday during one of the intervals of the trial of Will Orpet, who was charged with the slaying of a girl who was once his sweetheart. He was found wandering disorientedly in the great rear hallway. Orpet was shot another and a last note of pity crept into the conversation.

Would Adopt Daughter.

"We've been talking things over, mamma and I," he said. "I've only been lately that I could talk to her at all about it. It always made her cry. But lately now we've been able to look at things a little better and we kind of think we'd like to adopt a child. Of course, it ought to be a girl. I don't know just how to go about it. We'd have to have just the right sort of a girl, you know. What we'd like would be a girl about Marion's age. I think it would cheer mamma up. Marion was the only one we had and we're pretty lonely, especially in the evenings sitting there."

The old man took off his hat and twisted it round and round in his big brown hands.

"I can't get over the idea that we might have done a little better by Marion," he added. "If we can get some lonely girl who hasn't a mother and father of her own and if we can make her a little happier and give her a good home and a new start in life, we kind of think we'll be spaking up for that."

Explicit Faith in Her.

"No parent ever lived who put more faith and trust in a daughter than mamma and I. But we made mistakes. She was our first baby and the only one. We couldn't help making mistakes. We know better now.

"It is possible our daughter made a mistake. Minnie, I don't say she did. I don't say anything against her. But I'd like to warn the mothers and daddies of other daughters so they don't make mistakes. She ought to have lived with her daughters and take an active part in their lives. I used to read the board was sweet and innocent little thing that she couldn't ever do anything wrong and I didn't think any one would ever harm her."

"She used to read us lots of the letters she got from Orpet. But now we have no more of them. I don't let us see. There was the trouble.

Duty of Mothers.

"Mothers ought to read the letters their daughters get from young men. They ought to read them. Let the daughters read them first. Don't open their mail. That wouldn't be right. It would only make them think you didn't care for them. By it's just a message of friendship or love she's getting, there isn't any one in the world who ought not to read to show it to, let alone her mother and father.

"Too many people think that the first love is foolish. Lots of our women can't see when their daughters are getting to be grown up. They make a fur of the love affairs and the letters. That's a mistake. Folks ought to be sensible about such things.

And from thinking over things this way, Lambert has got so that he hasn't much bitterness toward Orpet. He is willing to take some of the blame on his own shoulders. He says Orpet is just a boy and didn't know any better. He says the grown folks should have been keeping watch.

Doesn't Want Hnaging.

"I don't think I ought to hang the boy," he said, with a serious emphasis on the dread word. "I ought to give him a prison sentence—a good stiff one, because he's not his lesson to learn and that's the only way he'll learn it. And while he's locked up, he'll do a lot of thinking and that will be punishment to him. He'll repent and he'll come out at the end a good man. That's the way I look at it."

The business of jury picking continued today. Deep, ingrained, unchangeable opinion here says that Orpet is guilty of the crime and it is a difficult thing to find twelve men who are willing even to consider the evidence in the case fairly and impartially before arriving at a decision.

U. S. BOY REBEL CADET

Pupil of Irish President is in Prison; Will Be Released.

New York, May 18.—Luke Kilgallon of Far Rockaway, Long Island, was notified today by the state department at Washington that his son, John Kilgallon, 23 years, under arrest in Dublin for charges of participating in the Sinn Fein revolt, would soon be released. Young Kilgallon was a student in the school conducted by Patrick H. Pearse, the "president" of the Irish republic, since executed.

According to information received by his father, the boy, with a number of fellow students, were enlisted in a cadet company by the Sinn Fein leaders in Dublin. The purpose for which they were being trained.

MERGE PUBLICATIONS

Consolidation of Baptist Societies in Big Debate Before Convention.

Minneapolis, May 18.—Consideration of the report of the efficiency committee on the proposal to merge the missionary work of the American Baptist churches and the American Baptist Home Mission society, is the principal business before the Northern Baptist convention today. The committee report recommended that, in as much as a large sum of money is needlessly expended by the two major societies of the church covering the same ground all missionary work should be directed by a single body.

Despite the fact that the amalgamation is voted, the convention is expected to vote to abolish the system by which the convention takes care of its foreign and home mission systems and its Sunday school work. The proposal to abolish the system was made last night in the form of a motion by M. H. Wolfe, of Dallas, Texas, who yesterday received 45 votes less than did the Rev. Dr. Lansing Barrows, who was re-elected president of the convention.

THEY WOULD PARADE

Washburn Law Students Forbidden to Make Mexican Demonstration.

Will the Washburn law school hold its annual Mexican war demonstration this year? The last two years on May 30 the members of the law school have marched in procession to the college, armed with tin horns, lath swords and all the terrible paraphernalia of war. From the college the Washburn army consisting of some 400 students invades the business district, letting the Topeka business men know of Washburn's "pep" and "derring-do" before the parade.

But this year stern orders have been issued from the office of Dean Hughes of the law school, that on account of the Mexican feeling there is to be no demonstration under the threat of letting the participants have their expulsion or no expulsion, or at least quit school. Law school student leaders insist that they are going anyway, expulsion or no expulsion, and are threatening to lock their students in rather than let them join the "On to Mexico" parade if it materializes.

ASQUITH ON IRISH BOARD.

LONDON, May 18.—The Dublin correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph company says he understands on good authority that Premier Asquith is to be sworn as a member of the Irish privy council, becoming by this act a member of the Irish executive. This is possibly the step, the correspondent adds, toward re-establishment of civil administration in Ireland.

Lawrence, Kan., May 18.—Plans have been made for the holding of a big canoe regatta here next Saturday under the direction of Dr. James Nalson, who is probably the highest ranked chairman of the state delegation, as well as the national committee man, will be named at the first meeting of the state delegation in Chicago.

CONFIDENT THAT HE'LL WIN

Jayhawker Friends Feel That He Is Logical Man.

Sentiment for Fitzpatrick as Chairman of Delegation.

Kansas will probably have a voice in the writing of the next Republican national platform. A campaign has been started for the election of Charles F. Scott of Iola as a member of the resolutions committee in the national convention in Chicago June 1.

Scott's prominence in national politics, his strength at home and his nationwide acquaintance among party leaders will give him a decided strength and following when the convention is organized. Sentiment was expressed by a majority of the delegation points to the almost certain re-election of Fred E. Stanley of Wichita as chairman of the state delegation, as well as the national committee man, will be named at the first meeting of the state delegation in Chicago.
