Sentiment for Colonel Sweeping Through Mountains.

None of "Favorite Sons" Will Satisfy the West.

Chicago, May 19.—Roosevelt sentiment is sweeping all else before it in the Rocky mountain region, is the message that was brought to Progressive convention headquarters in the Auditorium hotel here by Clarence Phelps Dodge of Colorado Springs, Col., state chairman of his party. Neither Hughes, Root, Cummins nor any of the favorite sons will satisfy the voters of the west, according to Mr. Dodge. The call for Roosevelt comes from Democrats as well as Republicans and Progressives, he says. "The liberal minded voters in the west have made such a sturdy fight for their principles that it is foolish to believe that they can be switched to any candidate just for the sake of harmony," said Mr. Dodge. "When it comes to Roosevelt party lines have been eliminated. The Republican standpaters who do not want to be for Roosevelt because of their pride now say openly what they said secretly a few months ago, that the colonel is the only man who can bring back our national honor. The progressives are unanimously of the same mind. There are many Democrats who balk at voting for a Progressive or Republican, yet who, when it comes to a showdown between the spirit of Americanism and the Democratic party, will choose the man who stands for red blooded, virile nationalism. "How about Root and Hughes?" "There is little Root sentiment because of his former connection with

New York corporations, his guidance of the Republican convention in 1912 and his old age. As for Hughes, the west likes a man to be outspoken, perfectly free and aboveboard in national problems. No one knows where Hughes stands. Besides, he is not the type of man whose personality appeals to western voters."

**AIR CRUISERS ARE NEXT**

French to Launch New Design Aero Fighters Carrying Big Guns.

Paris, May 18.—Monster French air cruisers—each mounting one of the famous "soixante-quinze" guns so destructive at Verdun—will be in action against Germany's air forces before many weeks. Successful experiments with this new terror of the air have just been completed.

In all probability Aviator Sergeant Treilly Grandjean, of several recent air exploits will pilot the first of the new battle planes. He has been directing the experiments in which huge aeroplanes have carried the "75's" in rehearsal battles.

**SAW WOMAN EXECUTED**

Mrs. Dodd, 83, Witnessed Hanging of Conspirator Against Lincoln.

Pittsburg, Pa., May 19.—Mrs. Priscilla C. Dodd, aged 83, widow of General Levi A. Dodd, and the only woman who witnessed the hanging of Mrs. Mary E. Surratt in Washington, District of Columbia, July 8, 1865, when the latter was found guilty as one of the plotters of the assassination of Abraham Lincoln, is dead here at a relative's home. General Dodd was on duty in Washington at the time of the execution and his wife secretly viewed it.

**AT STATE Y. M. C. A. ELECT 2 BISHOPS**

First Annual High School Camp Conference May 30.

Only Boys Over 15 Years of Age Eligible at Elmdale.

**MANY PLANS FOR 'ROUGHING IT'**

Hikes in Chase County Will Be One of Features.

No Firearms or Tobacco Allowed Students.

One hundred and fifty high school boys will gather at the state Y. M. C. A. camp at Elmdale May 30 for the fifth annual high school camp conference. This is the first of the two camp conferences for the summer. It is open only to high school boys over 15 years of age. June 9 the regular camp, open to boys from 12 to 17 years old, will commence. For a month Elmdale and the surrounding territory will be more thickly populated with boys than with back rabbits. This year the camp is to be open only one month. Next year the camp will be open all year and will be enlarged and Kansas boys by the hundreds can avail themselves of the opportunities of the camp.

The daily program for the first section of the camp which is intended primarily for the training of student leaders in Y. M. work is as follows: Daily Program.

- 6:00—Reveille.
- 6:30—Breakfast.
- 7:00—Camp duties.
- 7:30—Bible study groups.
- 8:15—Elective training groups.
  - a—Older boy leadership.
  - b—Scout-craft.
- 9:00—Conference period.
  - a—High school clubs.
  - b—High school Y. M. C. A.'s.
  - c—Organized counties.
  - d—Scout-craft (continued).
- 9:45—Group games; organized play and social activities.
- 10:30—Platform address on life work.
- 11:30—Swimming.
- 12:15—Dinner.
- 1:00—Leaders' meeting and hour of meditation and study for delegates.
- 2:00-4:00—Athletics (except swimming).
- 4:00—Swimming.
- 6:00—Supper.
- 6:30—Group games.
- 7:15-8:30—"Vespers."
- 8:30—Evening "Doings."
- 9:15—"Quarters."
- 10:00—"Taps" all quiet.

The second part of the camp is devoted more to recreations and good times. Swimming, baseball, tennis, hikes to Chase county points of interest, "Wheeler Hill" and "Cassie Hill," boating, photography, nature study are the main items of the days.

This section of the camp open to boys from twelve to seventeen years of age.

**Regulations and Requirements.**

"Roughing it" is the style in which the camp life is to be conducted. In the bulletin sent out over the state the first advice proffered is "Don't bring your best clothes." The "necessary articles" for the Y. M. C. A. boy's kit are as follows: Two heavy blankets, old clothes, bathing suit, socks (not required), handkerchiefs, a towel, soap, brush, knife, fork, spoon, pie-pan, tin-cup, a small bag, a notebook for nature study and the Bible. If he cares to do so the boy may bring tennis shoes, camera, baseball supplies, tennis racket, musical instruments, fishing tackle, one good story book. Three rules must be always observed according to L. K. Hall of the state "Y." First, no firearms or tobacco allowed; second, no one in the swimming hole except at designated times; third, a gentleman always. Outside of these restrictions the boys can be boys and frolic to the limit. The camp is to be under the supervision of L. K. Hall, high school secretary, and T. H. Vaughan of Lawrence.

**TO FIGHT GERMANS**

American Legion 1,800 Strong Will Leave Toronto, Can.

Troop Ship Will Be Convoys by Japanese Cruiser.

Washington, May 19.—The American legion, 1,800 strong, will leave Toronto Friday night for the battle front, somewhere in France, according to reliable information reaching Washington. The American regiment, made up of former United States regulars, veterans of the Spanish-American war and the Philippine campaign, will be part of some five or six thousand troops sailing at that time.

Although the state department has protested to the British government against permitting the men of the American legion to wear the stars and stripes as part of their military insignia, there is such a strong sentiment favorable to this in Canada that Canadian authorities will take no action. The regimental badge consists of a blending of the union jack and the American colors.

Another interesting sidelight on Canadian troop movements is disclosed in the news that Japanese cruisers have been for months conveying Canadian troop ships to Europe. A Japanese war vessel will accompany the transport carrying the American legion.

**IN PREPAREDNESS TEST**

U. S. Navy Arsenal Works Full Capacity on Rush Orders for Shells.

Norfolk, Va., May 19.—Rush orders of 10,000 6-inch and 10,000 5-inch shells are being filled at the Norfolk navy yard in what yard officials say is a preparedness test. Capacity forces are busy at the work.

**Methodist Deadlock Broken After Long Voting.**

Nicholson of N. Y. and Welch of Ohio Successful.

Saratoga Springs, N. Y., May 19.—Two new bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church were chosen by the general conference after three days of balloting. They are Dr. Herbert Welch, president of Ohio Wesleyan university, Delaware, Ohio, and Dr. Thomas Nicholson of New York city, secretary of the church board of education. Both are leaders in the educational work of the denomination. The election of Doctor Welch came on the eighth ballot and that of Doctor Nicholson on the ninth ballot. Each is 54 years old.

Although the deadlock which has existed since Tuesday was broken by the selection of the two bishops, five remain to be chosen. Doctor Nicholson received 553 votes, or 21 more than was necessary for a choice. None of the others made large gains. In the season's vote being about the same as earlier in the day. The result of the tenth

ballot, which was taken immediately, will be announced tomorrow. Doctor Nicholson has been, since 1908, secretary of the board of education of the church. He was born in Woodsburn, Canada, and was educated at Northwestern university and Garrett Biblical institute. From 1903 to 1908 he was president of Dakota Wesleyan university at Mitchell, S. D. Declare for World Sobriety. The Methodist Episcopal church declared today in favor of national prohibition, world sobriety and the eradication of every form of the liquor evil.

New Catholic Bishop to Omaha. Washington, May 19.—The appointment of the Most Rev. J. J. Hart, archbishop of Manila, P. I., since 1903, as archbishop of Omaha, Neb., to succeed the late Bishop Richard Scannell, was announced here last night by Monsignor Bonzano, the apostolic delegate. Archbishop Hart, who is a native of St. Louis, organized the parish of St. Leo's there in 1885. His successor has not been announced.
