WILL EXILE SONS Late China President Orders Four of Seven Sons Sent to England.

Peking, July 28.—In accordance with the late President Yuan Shi Kai's final instructions, sons and daughters of the dead ruler are preparing today to be sent to many widely separated places in charge of government officials.

Before his death, Yuan directed that his eldest, second and third sons and all his daughters and concubines should return to his native place to be cared for by Yuan Shi-fu, his fifth youngest brother.

Danger of Uprising Passes. His fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh sons were ordered sent to England, in charge of Yen Hsu, former minister of education, for their schooling. His four youngest daughters were entrusted to the care of Hau Shihchang, former secretary of state. Several weeks having elapsed since the death of the ruler, the tension at foreign legations here is decreased and fear that a disturbance similar to the Boxer war might be imminent has been dissipated.

For some time after Yuan's death foreigners believed danger near. At several of the legations machine guns were thrown up, machine guns placed at advantageous positions and large stores of food prepared for a siege. Foreigners were warned to be ready to seek the shelter of their legations at a moment's notice.

SLUMP IN POTATOES Both Shipments and Prices Decline at Kansas City.

Kaw valley potato shipment slumped slightly again Wednesday. The Kansas City market was weak and the demand moderate, the government report also being rather gloomy. The report also estimates that since July 1 one car a day has been hauled into Topeka for consumption here and 100 bushels a day into Lawrence.

Forty-six cars were shipped from the Kaw valley Wednesday. The Kansas City market for market potatoes averaged around 55 cents a bushel by the load. Many eastern markets, were higher.
