Magician, Wise Man From East, Sneers Atwood.

K. C. Man Delivers Kevenor Before Missouri Democrats.

RAISES G. O. P. EPIDERMIS

Attacks Campaign Statements of Gov. Hughes.

Extols Woodrow as Party Idol—Predicts Re-election.

Jefferson City, Mo., Aug. 22.—John H. Atwood of Kansas City, who made the "keynote" address as permanent chairman before the Missouri State Democratic convention here today, and home to the national and state Democratic administrations and closed with the statement:

"We have promised and we have performed." Mr. Atwood replied to Justice Hughes' criticisms of the national Democratic administration and charged the Republican nominee for president with having been the "only man in the country" who has not been a hunting hawk made from a judicial robe. His speech, in part, follows:

Should Thank Democracy. "Never has the world had such occasion to thank God for Democracy as in this year of grace. In two-thirds of the world, all religions that teach man's brotherhood are palsied; the shadow on the dial has moved back a million years; the cave man has returned and, in all but garb and arms, he is the contemporary of the cave bear and the saber-toothed tiger.

C. S. May Adopt Steel Head Gear Used by French and British. Washington, Aug. 22.—Steel helmets may be adopted in the United States army as a result of the French war adopted in Europe. The French and British army have adopted this helmet for their men along the Belgian front. It was found the metal had an additional protection from death from shrapnel fire. The bureau of ordinance of the war department has obtained one of the new French helmets and one of the new British helmets and is making the foundation for consideration of adoption.

NO AIR RAIDS IN IRELAND. Emerald Isle for Present Is Exempt From Zeppelin Attacks. Berlin, Aug. 22.—Ireland is outside the zone prescribed for Zeppelin attacks. So far as Zeppelins are concerned, Ireland is not regarded as an enemy territory in the sense that England and Scotland are, and the Emerald Isle, for the present, at least, will be as free from Zeppelins as it is of snakes.

Beetroot and Bean Salad By CONSTANCE CLARKE. FOR a delicious salad, peel some cooked beetroots and cut them up into round slices. Sprinkle these with olive oil, a little vinegar, a little salt and white pepper. Place them on the dish on which they are to be served, cover with hard-boiled eggs, which are sliced and seasoned in the same way as the beetroots; lay on this some long strips of cooked string beans, seasoned with a little olive oil; place round the beetroot and hard-boiled eggs, seasoned with a little olive oil and tarragon vinegar, and serve.
