10 MILLIONAIRE MILKED OUT OF ENTIRE FORTUNE

In 20 Years Coterie of Friends Get \$5,000,000.

Habitués of Underworld Led Him Merry Pace.

WOMAN SAYS \$140,000 GIFTS

Unscrupulous Lawyers Blamed by Creditors of Estate.

Private Papers Mostly "L. O. U.'s" From \$500 to \$7,000.

Chicago, Aug. 25.—Edward W. Morrison, the 80-year-old recluse, whose vanished millions are a subject of investigation before Judge Landis in the United States district court, was declared today to have been milked out of property valued at \$5,000,000 by a coterie of strange characters within the last twenty years.

Francis J. Houllhan, counsel for Morrison's creditors, declared that unscrupulous lawyers, women and habitués of Chicago's underworld came into the life of the aged man, whose wealth is estimated from \$3,000,000 to \$8,000,000, to obtain his money.

He was taken on trips to other cities," Houllhan declared. "Women were brought to see him, and new characters introduced to keep his fortune dwindling."

Search of the reclusive's quaint old two-story house revealed \$117,750 in cash and a bundle of old papers, cancelled checks and notes.

No Trace of Deeds. In one paper almost one hundred "L. O. U.'s" written in various hands, and which total something over \$150,000, were found.

Each slip of paper bore "L. O. U.'s" for amounts ranging from \$7,000 to \$500, and titles and other records of ownership to property reported to be worth \$6,000,000 were found.

HOW RAISE DEFICIT Democrat Administration to Meet Deficit of \$245,000,000.

Washington, Aug. 25.—That the Wilson administration is seeking to suppress the fact that the deficit for this fiscal year will be \$245,000,000 larger than has ever been explained to congress or to the public is the conviction of those who have been studying the situation in the light of Secretary McAdoo's own statements.

Some time ago, before the preparedness bills were framed and before the second invasion of Mexico, Mr. McAdoo went before the ways and means committee and stated that, allowing \$100,000,000 for the increase of the preparedness appropriations, it would be necessary to raise by special taxes \$150,000,000.

The preparedness bills have now been framed and they exceed those of last year by \$244,000,000, in round numbers \$400,000,000. This includes the \$41,000,000 efficiency appropriation for the Mexican military mobilization, etc.

The special taxes imposed in the revenue bill are to raise \$205,000,000. By the time the remaining \$245,000,000 to come from? Not from the proposed \$130,000,000 bond sale, because the administration clearly expects that the deficit will be \$115,000,000.
