

THREE MEN BADLY HURT

Chicago School Superintendent, Editor and Banker in Auto Smash.

Danville, Ill., Aug. 28.—John D. Shoop, superintendent of schools of Chicago is in a hospital here seriously injured as a result of an automobile turning turtle at Woodyard station, a few miles south of Danville, at 8 o'clock last night.

F. P. Hager of Paris, editor of the Polgar county bank had his right shoulder crushed, his jaw broken and is injured internally. He will recover.

WILL SUBMIT TO INOCULATION BY PARALYSIS GERM

New York, Aug. 28.—Miss Theodora Booth, daughter of General Ballington Booth, is willing that New York scientists should inoculate her with infantile paralysis virus and that she should pass thru every stage of the disease under their care if her sacrifice will aid in the battle against the plague.

Her offer came after she had observed the ravages of the plague and is founded on her belief that her athletic physique would prevent any serious results that the disease might have.

Kalamazoo, Aug. 28.—An official inquiry which lasted until early today failed to determine the cause for the smashup at the automobile derby here yesterday or to place the blame. Eleven racing cars came together. Two racers were killed and eight drivers and mechanics were more or less seriously injured.

So far as determined the crash was caused by the wrecking of the Sunbeam car, driven by Jack Peacock, who was killed.

Dallas, Texas, Aug. 28.—Motor Cop Jared McConico's star saved his life early today when he climbed through the window of his home and was mistaken for a burglar by his room mate, John Gleason, a bank employee.

A bullet from Gleason's revolver was deflected by the bit of metal and narrowly missed McConico's heart. The policeman was badly wounded, but is expected to recover.
