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WILL ANSWER IT

City Officials Do Not Like Charges of Graff.

May Go to Court in E. A. Austin Matter.

If possible legal action will be taken by the city against Edwin A. Austin, a Topeka attorney, for charges of graft made against the weed cutting department.

"We will certainly go the limit in answering such charges as that," said Commissioner Porter.

In his letter, Austin states that he received notice to cut the weeds on the lots and immediately employed men to perform the labor.

Charge Deliberate Graff. "The inclusion of these lots in ordinance No. 4654 to pay for cutting weeds is a gross injustice."

Commissioner Porter declares that the weeds not only needed cutting on those lots but need it again and that the city employees will be instructed to cut them again.

State Laws Needed to Curb Kansas Streams. State laws to curb Kansas streams and permit associations with federal department in flood prevention movements have been urged by T. J. Strickler.

Information gathered by Strickler shows that flood losses in Kansas in thirteen years have totalled \$52,000,000, or \$4,000,000 a year.

Large appropriations will be needed to carry on flood prevention work in Kansas, Strickler reports.
