

THREE PRINCES NOW COMMAND WESTERN FRONT

Kaiser Puts Rupprecht of Bavaria Over Somme.

Albrecht on North Sector, Crown Prince at Verdun.

BULGARIANS EVACUATE KAVALA

Leave Greek Seaport Forts Recently Occupied.

British Artillery Fires Two German Munition Depots.

Beilin, via London, Sept. 12.—Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria has now assumed the over-command of the German armies on the Somme front.

The appointment of Prince Rupprecht was effected before the latest visit of an Associated Press correspondent to Bavaria last week but the news could not be cabled until the announcement in the official army headquarters report to day, which recalls a general reorganization of commands brought about by the appointment of Field Marshal von Hindenburg as chief of staff.

The new order divides the western front into three sectors and assigns these to three princely commanders who, regardless of reasons of policy which dictated their appointments to command of armies at the beginning of the war, have won their spurs by the successful operations.

Prince Albrecht, prospective heir to the kingdom of Wurttemberg, who is in command of the northern sector, before war had risen to the rank of general and corps commander. He inflicted the first great defeat on the French in the dash northward through Belgium.

Crown Prince Rupprecht, in command of the central sector, was the victor in the battle in Lorraine which crushed and repulsed the French invasion of Germany in 1914.

The German crown prince has the over-command in the Verdun sector.

Alber Warships Near Kavala.

Paris, Sept. 12.—The Petit Patriote says it learns from a semi-official source that the Bulgarians have evacuated all the forts at the Greek seaport of Kavala, which they occupied last month.

The forts are said to have been handed over to the Greeks. They were of no military value to the Bulgarians after the arrival of warships

SPA COLLAPSE OF BIG BRIDGE KILLED ELEVEN

Estimate Loss at \$1,000,000 to Construction Company.

Stories Vary as to Cause of Quebec Catastrophe.

SOME SAY THE SPAN BUCKLED

Others, Hoisting Supports Didn't Work Uniformly.

Will Commence Work of Reconstruction at Once.

Quebec, Sept. 12.—The St. Lawrence Bridge commission and the Quebec Bridge commission are conducting a joint investigation today into the collapse of the central span of the Quebec cantilever bridge over the St. Lawrence river while it was being hoisted into position. The death toll remains at eleven.

Accounts of survivors of the disaster and spectators are at hopeless variance, some holding that the span itself buckled first and others that the hoisting supports did not work uniformly, thereby throwing too much strain on the supports.

Entire charge of the reconstruction work said today that as soon as the cause of the accident is ascertained, the work of either reconstructing a new span or raising the collapsed one will be immediately undertaken. It was estimated the work will cost \$1,000,000.

The opening of the bridge scheduled for next spring has been indefinitely postponed. Quebec harbor officials on finding that the fallen span did not block the channel, permitted today the resumption of navigation by ocean going vessels.

NEW NAME FOR WOLLIES.

They Will Be Known as "Millionaires" in Colorado Springs.

Colorado Springs, Sept. 11.—From today the Wichita baseball team will be known as the "Millionaires." The Kansas club today formally was transferred to Colorado Springs and the remainder of the games of the season will be played here.

On Wednesday the Omaha team will begin a series of three games with the Millionaires. F. C. Zehring, president of the Western league, who is here announced the league will take all risks connected with the venture, the local fans being asked to give their moral support only.

Yaquels Raid a Ranch.

Nogales, Ariz., Sept. 12.—Seven men and two women were killed by Yaqui Indians in a raid upon the Louis G. Groux ranch in lower Sonora, according to a report brought here today by caretakers of the ranch.

Later the raiders were pursued by General Anglo Flores with a force of Carabineros. The Mexican command here substituted a report that these Indians were heading for the Chihuahu mountains to join Francisco Villa.

COLO. VOTING TODAY

Governor Carlson's Renomination Contested by Sam D. Nicholson.

Denver, Sept. 12.—An extremely tight vote in the country districts, which political leaders attribute to the heavy crops and scarcity of labor, is expected today in the statewide primary, the heaviest polling is in cities and towns.

The voters are having their final say today on the men "designated" by the state convention as primary candidates. The Democratic convention made Julius C. Gunter their unanimous choice for governor. He is unopposed in the primary. The Republicans "designated" George B. Carlson, the present incumbent, and Samuel D. Nicholson to fight it out in today's battle.

Under the Colorado primary law, if a candidate receives 10 per cent of the vote in the primary, he is entitled to a place on the primary ballot. As a result of this, nominations for various state offices are being contested for by many men.

DIDN'T GET HALICZ?

Ferlin Says Teutons Still Hold Strong-Hold Against Russians.

Berlin, Sept. 12.—Russian attempts to capture the town of Halicz, on the Danube in Galicia, regarded as the key to the defenses of Lemberg by the southeast, have been frustrated by the Teutonic forces, according to today's official war office announcement. Troops under Gen. Count von Bothmer brought the Russian efforts to naught, the statement declared.
