SUES PAGE MILLS

Charge of "Fraudulently Convincing" With Inspector.

Action by Kansas Milling Co. for Alleged Loss.

Suit was filed in the district court today by the Kansas Milling company against the Thomas Page Milling company for \$263.77 and the former charges the Page Milling company with "fraudulently convincing" with George Busell, local inspector for the State Grain Inspection department.

The Kansas Milling company alleges that August 20 it sold a carload of wheat to the Page Milling company on contract for \$1.31 a bushel; that the grain was shipped as No. 3 wheat, but that when it arrived in Topeka the grain inspector reported it as "dark and yellow and hot at the bottom of the car."

The plaintiff company alleges that the wheat was then sent on to Kansas City where, because of a drop in the market, it was sold for \$263.77 less than the Page Milling company had contracted to pay.

APPEAL MURDER CASE

Silverdale Doctor Convicted of Killing Henley, Goes to Higher Court.

Winfield, Kan., Sept. 15.—Attorneys for Dr. George W. Farrar, a physician of Silverdale, Kan., who last night was found guilty by a jury here of the murder of Harvey H. Henley, were preparing today an appeal to the higher courts in his behalf.

The doctor was first degree murder. Farrar killed Henley, according to the testimony, in the rear of the building of a new lodge hall. On the night of the shooting, the two met at the entrance of the old hall and the shooting took place. Doctor Farrar testified that he shot in self-defense.

ENGLAND WHACKS BACK

Rationing Neutrals Extends to U. S. in Prohibiting Shipments.

London, Sept. 15.—The plan of rationing the neutral countries of North America, Denmark and Holland, under which no further licenses will be granted for the present to British exporters, has been extended to apply to the United States by the expected refusal to allow the Netherlands overseas trust to accept further American consignments and by declining to grant licenses for American goods and American shipments destined for these countries.

In consequence, American shipments for Holland will be stopped absolutely, while the regular transportation companies trading between the United States and Scandinavia will be granted licenses for American goods of their innocent destination by the British authorities.

It is expected that Washington will make an inquiry in regard to this matter, especially as to the American schooners which were taken into Lerwick and released after being detained for several weeks. No charges were preferred against them.

Another blockade measure which also probably will interest Washington is the recent arrangement under which bureaus were set up in England and France for granting licenses for exchange of goods which figure on the list of prohibited imports.
