

RUSSIA BARS N. Y. RABBI

Not Because He Is Jew, But Due to Pro-German Affiliation.

Petrograd, Sept. 19.—Dr. Judah Leon Magnes, noted New York rabbi, was barred from Russia not because he was a Jew, but because his public utterances had classified him as pro-German.

Attorney Henry Slobzberg, a leading Jew member of the Jewish relief committee, and for thirty years an active Israelite worker, made a statement today. He explained why Dr. Magnes was refused admission to Russia after he had come to Europe to distribute a fund for relief of Jewish refugees from the war zone raised in America.


