

WAIT ON INCREASE

Oklahoma Farmers Are Holding Bulk of Corn Crop.

Cotton Condition Slightly Improved, Crop Report Shows.

Oklahoma City, Nov. 1.—Oklahoma farmers apparently are holding back the bulk of their corn crop for further increases in prices.

The condition of growing cotton in Oklahoma has improved 4 per cent over that of a month ago, according to the report.

CLUE TO SHIP'S FATE

Life Boat of Overdue Vessel "A. Davidson," Washes Ashore. London, Nov. 1.—A Lloyd's dispatch from Newquay, Cornwall, says that a ship's life boat marked "A. Davidson," has been washed ashore at Perranporth.

The last report of the steamship A. Davidson is of her departure from Montreal, October 4, for Havre. The Davidson was much overdue and the news that the life boat had been picked up caused the rate of reinsurance to rise to 70 guineas per cent.

American Manufacturers Opposed to Any Retaliatory Measures. New York, Nov. 1.—At its seventh annual convention here the American Manufacturers' Export association went on record as being opposed to retaliatory measures by the United States. The resolution declared: "That the export manufacturers do not favor a hatched third principle policy of retaliation at the close of the European war on account of obstacles which may be found in the way of the expansion of United States trade during the war.

ENDS MIDWEST TOUR

Hughes Winds Up Indiana Tour, Then to New York State. Evansville, Ind., Nov. 1.—Today marked the last appearance before election in the middle west of Charles E. Hughes. Mr. Hughes left Evansville at 8 o'clock for Sullivan, where he will speak this forenoon.

The nominee will remain at Sullivan an hour. He will then speak at Linton, where he will remain thirty minutes, Bloomington, where an hour's stay is on the program, and Brazil. After an evening speech at Terre Haute will be the speaker's last presidential speech in the state. Leaving Terre Haute at 9 o'clock tonight, Mr. Hughes will re-enter New York state, where a two-day tour will virtually end his campaign. When the tour is completed Mr. Hughes will go to New York City, reaching there Friday night. He will speak in Brooklyn that night and make his last public appearance of the campaign Saturday night at Madison Square garden.
