At the Washburn rural high school, the plan is to continue the school later in the spring, also, and to hold school on alternate Saturdays.

Elmer Berg, athletic coach, has just returned from New York, where he attended a conference of athletic men, and is making plans for the track and basketball work in the college.

Some inter-fraternity football teams will be organized, and the literary societies and other clubs' organizations will have their own teams.

Discharge 10 Per Cent. At present there is authority to discharge up to 10 per cent of the enlisted personnel, enlisted men coming within the classes set forth, that is, to relieve sickness or distress in the family or to take up some occupation where their services are urgently needed.

Men With Families Go First. "First—Men who have families of their own, which families need their presence to prevent distress."

Those Men Who Have Their Own Personal Business Enterprises or are Partners in Such (Including Farms) which business enterprises are suffering financial loss thru lack of their personal attention.

Those Men Not Coming Within the First Three Classes but who are skilled workmen, and whose services are urgently needed and called for by business concerns and farming interests.

Those Men Who Consider the Situation as Thus Set Forth, It is believed that they will see that the war department is doing all in its power to return to civil life as rapidly as possible, men who are needed there, but that there are certain practical conditions which limit the speed with which such men can be returned.
