

A NEW LINE OF SPECULATING. Sylvan Grove, Kan., June 30.—A new line of speculating in wheat crops here in the sale of wheat crops standing in the field. The farmers, fearing the hand of harvesting the crop and the possible shortage of

MUST HOLD DOWN

Overcrowding at State Hospitals Causing Concern. Observation Rules May Be Put Into Force Soon.

FIGHT AGAINST "UNLOADING"

New Blanks Will Be Sent to All Probate Judges. Persons Really Not Insane Will Not Be Taken.

Ten day observation rules for all state hospitals for the insane may be made by the state board of administration in an effort to safeguard against over-crowding which is now threatened. With vital changes in laws affecting admission of patients, Malcolm Gray, secretary of the board, today arranged for enforcement of a schedule of new rules and regulations.

All probate judges are to be advised as to the orders to be enforced by the board under the law providing for admission of voluntary patients at state hospitals. That the new law is to be guarded was made evident today in a review of applications now pending before the board.

Must Have Rigid Rules. "If the benefits of the new law are to be realized, its operation must be safeguarded and rigid rules observed by all local officials," said Secretary Gray. "It may be necessary to enforce the regulation providing for a ten day observation of all patients at state hospitals before they are finally admitted for treatment. If the patient is then shown to be insane, formal steps will be taken in providing for admission."

Gray expressed fear today that in a number of cases efforts might be made to "unload" persons on state institutions by taking advantage of the
