### COAL MEN MEET

Operators of All United States Soft Coal Mines in Session.

Consider Means of Establishing "Fair and Reasonable" Prices.

Cleveland, Ohio, Oct. 26.—Approximately 1,000 of the 1,700 soft coal operators in the United States, representing every bituminous producing district, met here today at the call of Col. D. F. Wentz, president of the National Coal association, to consider the telegram sent to the association by Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer. The telegram urged that steps be taken to eliminate exorbitant prices for bituminous coal at the mines.

That a resolution favoring "fair and reasonable" prices with only a reasonable profit for the operators, would be supported was predicted by operators previous to going into the conference hall.

A meeting of the National Coal association composed of 2,500 operators, who mine more than three-fourths of the coal produced in the United States, with an output of nearly 550,000,000 tons this year, was held in advance of the general conference.

An exhaustive survey of the soft coal situation was made at the general conference by Colonel Wentz. He told the operators that shortages throughout the country in the supply of coal from immediate use are rapidly being made up, owing to accelerated movements of coal shipments by the railroads during the last few weeks.

The emergency wants of the middle west and the east have been taken up by the operators, he continued, and great quantities of soft coal in the meantime have been rushed up to the Great Lakes for transshipment to northwestern points.

As soon as the Great Lakes supply has been sent up toward the end of November the 1,000,000 tons now going to the northwest by that route, Colonel Wentz said, will be released for the remainder of the country.

For the last three weeks, Colonel Wentz stated, soft coal production has exceeded 12,000,000 tons a week, the coal fixed by the operators as necessary to insure adequate supplies everywhere in the country for immediate uses and for the winter. If this output is maintained, he said, there would be no doubt but every part of the country will have sufficient coal.

### RAILWAYS CHARGE TOO MUCH.

Theatrical Concern Files Complaint Against Three Roads.

Discriminatory, unjust and prohibitive rates are charged against theatrical and amusement cars by the Katy, Frisco and Rock Island railroads, according to a complaint filed today with the court of industrial relations. The protest against charges is made by W. H. Rice as chairman of freight service for the Car Owners' Managers' association.

The association is composed of amusement, theatrical and circus folk. They own their own equipment. Charges for hauls over the three roads, however, are declared to be excessive and unreasonable and an adjustment of rates is asked in the case before the industrial court.

### SANTA FE SPIRIT AT DINNER.

At Least 250 Guests to Attend Saturday Night Affair.

The attendance prospects for the first dinner of the Santa Fe dinner club, which is held Saturday night, are mounting. Original arrangements were made for about 200 guests, and chief clerks from the general offices. Now the reservations are numbering close to 250. The speaker of the evening is to be J. R. Gardner, Lathrop, a well known solicitor for the road, at Chicago, who will speak on "The Santa Fe Spirit."

The Santa Fe Glee club is to furnish music during the evening.

Subjects under discussion will be paving on North Harrison street, extension of the city water service to North Topeka, proposed improvements on Calhoun bluffs on the old Grantville road, and the suggested interlocking system between the Union Pacific, Santa Fe and Rock Island railroads.

A caterer or restaurant man who feeds 1,000,000 customers a year, managing a staff of thirty-three stewards, 125 cooks and 165 waiters, has some job on his hands. Particularly when he has to adjust his service and his menus to suit the taste of the wealthy courtier on a transcontinental trip and the farmer who wants a sandwich on a trip across the state. T. A. Dempsey, superintendent of dining rooms on the Rock Island, has that little job. And in the past eight years his business has increased 75 per cent. Dempsey passed thru Topeka Monday on an inspection trip over the entire system. Dempsey's service is making good with the patrons of the road.

During the summer needy families of Topeka found it easy to do without carpets and stoves but with the coming of chilly weather and the winter, bare floors and headless rooms are hardly endurable. A number of families in which there are small children are suffering from the lack of such things, so the association is attempting to supply them. But carpets, stoves and other furniture for charitable distribution are scarce at the association. Miss Helen H. Stage, acting secretary, asks for such contributions, which would be greatly appreciated. Any kind of stoves, from the smallest gas stoves and oil heaters to kitchen ranges are needed, and carpets of any size will be most welcome.

Carl Chapman, colored, 17 years old, decided the only way to buck a pair of loaded dice was with a gun. So he went after Vincent Dickinson, 1011 Quincy, and at the point of a gun took \$25 away from him in a room near the Metropolitan pool hall about 11 o'clock Monday morning. Chapman was arrested Monday afternoon and being held in jail. A warrant is to be issued for him today to take the place of the investigation charge which is against him now. Chapman said Dickinson had taken \$17 away from him with a pair of loaded dice, so he had recourse to the gun. He was arrested in a barber shop near the rock island depot, and the gun was found hidden in the same shop. He readily confessed to bringing held up the winner in the "fixed" game.

### ENGINES TOO BIG FOR USE.

Rock Island Locomotives Won't Go Thru K. C. Train Sheds.

The Rock Island road has been cheated. Some brand new big engines were assigned to haul the Golden State Limited, one of the Rock Island trains do luxe. The engines are the finest product of the engine builders' art. They are huge affairs and would have made light work of hauling the big transcontinental trains—but they were too big.

The engines cannot be sent thru the Union Station at Kansas City. The train sheds there are too low to accommodate them, and they have been pulled off the transcontinental runs and are being kept on the eastern divisions of the road.

The delay which would be necessary in uncoupling them at Kansas City, sending them around the station while a smaller engine pulled the train thru, prohibits their use on the run west of Trenton, Mo.
