

RACHMANINOFF'S CONCERT

Dignity, mature judgment and deliberate execution were points of interest during the performance of this great musician last evening.

He played the Handel variations practically without using the pedal. In the Schumann C sharp (minor) Nocturne that followed he displayed unusual capacity for lighting color changes. As he interpreted this number it acquired new characteristics, so many of which I have heard or thought. The Weber-Tausig Invitation to the Dance is a well known number, largely overlooked by would-be pianists and amateur orchestras. This particular setting, however, is fortunate for too difficult for the abuse of what is like to call instrumental characters and Rachmaninoff renewed the love of the audience for this poetic, altogether pianistic gem.
