

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

The News from All Parts of the World.

ABROAD.

The British gunboat Wasp was wrecked on the north-west coast of Malacca on the 23d, and 12 of the crew were drowned. The dynamites are busy in Austria. The town hall at Vienna was partially destroyed by explosives on the 24th ult. The Mayor has also received menacing letters from Nihilists, stating that reprisals will be levied for the execution of the anarchists Stelmauer and Kommerer. It is reported that an outbreak of cholera has occurred near Odessa. The Government is trying to suppress the fact. On the 23d ult. 11 fresh cases of cholera developed at Alicante and six at Tarragona, Spain. There were three deaths at the latter and four at the former place. Two Sergeants and three Corporals belonging to the battalion doing duty in maintaining a sanitary cordon about Gerona deserted their post and fled to France. Italy the outbreak is now clearing than for some weeks past, especially in Naples, where the deaths have greatly decreased, though the mortality is still great. A tragic incident, growing out of the plague occurred in that city last week. A girl, 17 years of age, was seized with the dread disease, and her lover, anxious to be by her side, attempted to enter the room where she lay. The girl's mother, who was attending her, demurred and prevented his entrance. The young man thereupon drew a revolver, and in a mad frenzy shot the mother through the heart. According to the bedside of the girl, he put a bullet into her forehead and then attempted to end his own life with a shot. He succeeded only in wounding himself, and was carried to the hospital. At Marselles and Toulon, though an occasional death from the cholera occurs, the plague may be said to be a thing of the past. The siege of Khartoum has been abandoned, and the country in the neighborhood of the place is reported free from rebels. Gen. Wolsey has consequently telegraphed to stop forwarding troops to Egypt for the present. The elaborate preparations that have been made for the Gordon relief expedition will now prove unnecessary, as only a very small force will be sent to Khartoum. It is said that the Mahdi has 20 Krupp cannon, and that 10,000 of his 25,000 followers are armed with Remington rifles. While the British have transpired in the Franco-Chinese embargo, a solution of the trouble seems as distant as ever. The blocking of the mouth of the Woonung River by the Chinese, leaving an opening only for the passage of neutral ships. The Russian Consul has been ordered to protect French interests wherever French Consuls leave. The Russian fleet in Chinese waters comprises one iron clad, three cruisers, two corvettes, and six gunboats. Three other iron-clads are expected to arrive. This strength, in view of the smallness of Russian interests in China, is considered significant. The excitement of the Chinese is intense, and an uprising against foreign residents and native Christians is feared. An attempt was made on the 28th ult. to blow up the Consulate at Salisbury, Eng. A number of windows were smashed by the explosion, but otherwise no damage was done. No arrests have been made in connection with the outrage.

CRIMES AND CASUALTIES.

Theodore Bonlean, aged 18, and Hortense Paro, aged 16, both French Canadians, while walking home from a ball at Rochester, N. H., on the night of the 23d ult., were overtaken by a thunder storm, and both were struck by lightning. Bonlean was instantly killed. Miss Paro's hair, one arm, and hand were badly burned, and she has lost her reason. On the 23d ult. a post-boy broke loose at Rudrum, Idaho, and ran on the streets in a rage. The animal attacked a girl 12 years old, and dreadfully mangled the child with its teeth and claws, and nearly crushed her to death by hugging. Four men, hearing the child's screams, rushed to the rescue. The bear turned furiously on them, dropping the child. Three men were badly torn, one having a hand nearly chewed off. The fourth man escaped by running. An Italian barber at Kinzua, Pa., was, on the 23d ult., shot and killed by Mrs. Kavanagh, of the same place, while trying to forcibly enter her home in the absence of her husband. Blagovest Brodzki, a Pole, died at the General Hospital, Buffalo, N. Y., on the 23d ult. Three nights ago he was found with a fracture of the skull. Before he died he made a statement in which he claimed that he had been murdered. He was attended a dance, and while there flirted with a girl. While thus engaged a Pole named Michael Tabolski struck him in the forehead with a cow's horn, and he was often used by the Poles as weapons. A cyclone struck the village of Wellsburg, six miles east of Elmira, N. Y., on the 23d ult. Houses, barns and other buildings were unroofed, orchards were destroyed, and the streets were thickly strewn with trees. The wind was accompanied by a terrific rain storm, lasting for some time, and deluging the streets.

INDUSTRIAL.

The exports, exclusive of specie, from the port of New York for the week ending on the 23d ult. were \$7,090,717, against \$8,565,987 on the previous week, and \$7,442,024 for the week ending Sept. 25, 1883. The total exports for the year to date are \$237,788,223, against \$261,692,207 for the corresponding period last year. The shipments from the mines of the Cumberland coal region for the week ending Saturday, Sept. 20, 1884, were 60,522 tons, and for the year to date, 2,918,902 tons; an increase of 231,718 tons as compared with the corresponding period of 1883. The business failures for the United States and Canada for the week ending on the 23d ult. were 157 for the former and 26 for the latter.

POLITICAL.

An imposing demonstration in honor of Mr. Elihu was held in Philadelphia on the 23d ult. Gen. Logan was enthusiastically received at all the towns he passed through in his Ohio tour. A large Democratic meeting was held in Columbus, O., Thursday, during which the speakers' platform broke down, injuring quite severely Gen. J. W. Denver. Mr. St. John, the Prohibition candidate, will make speeches in Ohio, New York, Pennsylvania, Indiana and Illinois until the 24th of October.
