"A TOY FROM ANTIETAM."

A Story That is Very True—Who Can Tell?

EDITOR NATIONAL TRIBUNE: I notice the following taken from the Philadelphia Times, under the head "A Toy from Antietam."

Gen. Hector Tyndale Post, No. 160, of this city, has presented with a small brass cannon, which is apparently a toy, but it has historical interest. It was used at the battle of Antietam, Sept. 17, 1862, with deadly effect.

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
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
