Mrs. Mary Sherman, Secretary of the Confederation of Women's Clubs, tells us that a movement is on foot among the women of the Middle West to dignify housework and remove the stigma given it as an occupation by a certain class of women. This exceedingly wise movement is receiving the earnest support and assistance of the club women of these six States, Missouri being particularly alive to its importance. The Illinois has done more than any other State to teach household economics. In these troublous days, when the servant problem is ever present with us, growing more of a problem all the time, the necessity for every woman to have a practical knowledge of all the branches of housekeeping becomes more and more deeply felt. When a girl makes her marriage vows at the altar she agrees, the nothing is said about it in the service, to do her part in assuming the responsibilities of the new life about to be started in which the home plays such an important part. Indeed, home-making is supposed to be a woman's occupation by a certain class of women, and all that goes toward making this place where they have set up their Laredo and Penates a true home. How can she fulfill this sacred duty unless she knows how to cook and has a practical knowledge of all the branches of housework? What a miserable time it is for the young couple when without a cook, and the pretty but ignorant girl-wife takes charge of her meager kitchen. Tears and indignation follow. Of course, if the bride happens to be a practical

girl, with plenty of common sense, she takes a good cook book and buckles down to her job, and in a few days the end comes out with more or less flying colors. But the experience is a hard one for both, and she suffers a good deal from mortification, and the chances are she blames her mother for not having taught her at least the rudiments of cooking. If a girl has been brought up with a practical knowledge of housekeeping, no matter how many servants she may have when she marries, she is perfectly independent of them, and if anything happens to necessitate her taking the place of her cook she does it so easily and quietly, without any fuss or worry, that her fond young husband is more proud of her than ever, and realizes to an extent he had not before, as one savory dish after another prepared by her fair hands is put before him, what a treasure he has won. The happy, peaceful little household runs on so smoothly as ever through such an experience as this, with no strain on the nerves or affections. Housework as an occupation is receiving particular attention by this woman's movement. That a girl of poor but honest parents, a girl forced to take up the struggle for self-support at an early age, with very little education, should prefer to work in a shop, factory or almost any place except the comfortable home of some other woman, is a strange fact known to those that in the houses of our wealthy classes the upper servants have more liberty, have better food and lodgings and the chance to have more money than almost any other kind of women wage-earners.
