ANSWERS TO CORRESPONDENTS.

J. T. Deep River, Conn.: Soldiers who are disabled from earning a living can enter any of the National Homes, of which there are 125. The one at each in Ohio, Wisconsin, Maine, Virginia, Kansas, California, Indiana, Illinois, Tennessee, South Dakota and Washington, D. C. The National Home, War Department, Washington, D. C. Pensioners who enter National Homes, child or parent, and if not assigned it is drawn and held in trust by the Treasurer of the Home. The amount of pension is in certain conditions. Blanks for outdoor relief can be had from the Commissioners as above noted.

H. H. G. Hamilton, O.: Silver was coined in all denominations in nearly every year during the civil war. From 1859 to the present silver dollars have been coined, except in 1852 and in 1875, 1876 and 1878. The total dollars now number about 600,000,000. The dollar coinage of 1863 was at the Philadelphia and San Francisco Mints. The New Orleans Mint was closed from 1862 to 1868. The coins turned out by the Confederate Government at the New Orleans Mint are not legal tender, but have value far above face to collectors.

E. J. F. St. Paul, Minn.: The following item from a newspaper is important to me, if true: "Internal revenue tax on the deduction of the pay of the commissioned officers during the civil war can be refunded by making proper application to the War Department, Washington, D. C. This statement is true as it relates to part of the reimbursements of the tax, when it played a part in cases where the pay of officers was readjusted by an act of Congress passed in 1892. The amount of tax deducted was \$339,000,000 of income tax, and no law was ever enacted to return any of it, except in cases of readjustment of salaries on retirement. The amount of the amounts returned were small. If you paid an income tax and your salary was readjusted, write and state your case to the Auditor of the War Department, Washington, D. C."

G. E. M., Washington, D. C.: There is no premium on the silver dollar of 1884. Those of 1884 are worth \$100 or more in gold coin.

F. W. M. Sheridan, Wyo.: Good Friday of 1838 came on April 12.

H. W. H., Rosebud, Nev.: 1. The United States, from funds appropriated by Congress, supplies the needs of the militia or National Guard of each State or Territory on requisition of the governor, the States and Territories having a certain amount allowed by Congress each. 2. The United States pays the militia when participating in joint maneuvers with troops of the Regular Army, at the rate of pay prescribed by law. When the militia is in State camp payment is made from funds of the State, under State law, or from Federal funds obtained under section 1661, Revised Statutes of the United States, at rate established for the U. S. Army.

J. S., Waterloo, Iowa: If Columbus, Ky., was ever considered as a possible Capital of the United States it was a local proposition. It was never taken up from a National standpoint. When Washington City was chosen the Mississippi was the western boundary of the United States, and Kentucky was a far-away country. There was an earthquake in the Mississippi Valley in 1811, and considerable change in the surface of the earth in the neighborhood of Missouri and to lesser extent in other parts of the country south. There has been more or less talk of removing the Capital to the Alleghenies to St. Louis or Nashville, the two cities most talked of. The center of population will slowly approach the Mississippi, and it may finally be nearer St. Louis than any other large city. If the Capital is ever removed the disposition naturally would be to take it near the center of population.

During the civil war he served in the Army of the Potomac, enlisting in 1862, at the age of 17. His military record includes service in the 33d and 49th N. Y.; commissioned in 1864 and was promoted to the 23d U. S. C. T.; he was subsequently promoted to First Lieutenant, and received the brevet rank of Captain. After the fall of the Confederacy he was ordered to the Texas frontier, where he was stationed during the Maximilian trouble. On being mustered out in the Fall of 1865 he was offered a commission in the Regular Army, which he refused. He was a graduate of Union College, Schenectady, N. Y., and Auburn Theological Seminary, Auburn, N. Y., and was the Presbyterian minister. For many years he held pastorates in New York and Pennsylvania. The funeral services were held at the Woodlawn Park Presbyterian Church, Chicago, with interment at Oakwood Cemetery, in that city.

KING.—At his home in Granger, Medina County, O., Dec. 21, 1908, John W. King, 66. He was followed in death the next morning, Dec. 22, by his wife, Ella W. King, and they were buried in the same grave by his comrades of the Richard Keyes Post, of which he was a member.

WILABEE.—At Columbus, Kan., June 10, 1908, John Wilabee. He served Co. D, 94th Ill. His widow survives him.

PITTMAN.—At Bayonne, N. J., Oct. 24, 1908, John R. Pittman, in the 70th year of his age. At Lincoln's first call he enlisted and served three months in the 3d N. J. Artillery, and was discharged in Co. H, 6th N. J., and was promoted to Corporal; transferred Oct. 25, 1862, to the 2d U. S. Cav.; in November, 1862, he was transferred to the 11th U. S. Artillery, and served in the 11th U. S. Artillery, and was promoted to Sergeant. He was wounded by a sabre cut on wrist at Culpeper. His widow and three daughters survive him.

VAN HORN.—At his home in Three Rivers, Mich., Oct. 31, 1908, Wesley W. Van Horn, aged 66 years. He was born in Luzerne County, Pa., in 1842, and served in Co. I, 71st Pa., and also in the 4th N. J. At the time of his death he was Commander of Ed. M. Prutzman Post, Three Rivers, and was also a Justice of the Peace, holding the latter office 13 years. His widow and two sons survive him.

THOMAS.—At Scottdale, O., Sept. 26, 1908, Richard Thomas. He was born June 11, 1840, at Rockbridge, Va.; served in Co. L, 1st Ohio L. A. His widow, a son and a daughter survive him.

BAGGETT.—At Bay Minette, Ala., Dec. 1, 1908, Scoborn S. Baggett, who served as Sergeant in Co. F, 1st Ala. Cav. His widow and three minor children survive him.

GILLIS.—At Clinton, W. Va., Oct. 25, 1907, Thomas Gillis, aged 83 years. He was born in Northumberland, England; served in Co. B, 4th W. Va.; participated in the battle of Gettysburg, and in many of the most noted battles of the war against rebellion. One son and one daughter survive him.

BISSETTE.—At Mount, Minn., June 24, 1908, John Bissette, aged 62. He served in Co. H, 20th Wis. His widow and one son survive him. He was a good boy, good man, a good soldier.

HEINDEL.—At Pomona, Cal., Nov. 19, 1908, Jacob Heindel. He served in Co. A, 14th Cal. His widow and one son survive him.

HILLS.—At Pomona, Cal., Nov. 20, 1908, Charles Furman Hills. He served in Co. A, 14th Cal. His widow and one son survive him.

CLOUD.—At Stroud, Okla., Dec. 5, 1908, Bayless Cloud, aged 73 years. He served in Co. K, 8th Ill.; was at time of death a V. C. of Barber Post, 81 U. S. A. His widow and one son survive him.

DAVIS.—In the interior wilds of Mexico, two days' riding beyond civilization, while enjoying a hunt for large game, suddenly, on Oct. 23, 1908, S. P. Davis, M. D. He served as Adjutant in the 77th Pa. His home was at Lancaster, Pa. The body was not brought home.

ZELLERS.—At Lancaster, Pa., Dec. 26, 1908, George E. Zellers, in the 72d year of his life. He served as Lieutenant in Co. F, 122d Pa.

ZOOK.—At Lancaster, Pa., in November, 1908, J. Gust Zook. He served in the 77th Pa.

FORSYTHE.—At San Diego, Cal., Dec. 7, 1908, A. E. Forsythe, aged 63. He was born in Gwyness County, O.; served in Co. B, 124th Pa., and in Co. B, 185th Ohio, in the war against rebellion, and was mustered out of service with rank of Sergeant.

BEARDSLEY.—At Soldiers' Home, Lisbon, N. D., Nov. 27, 1898, Jerome C. Beardsley. He served in Co. B, 6th Wis. Intermittent was by the side of his wife at their old home, Trimble, Wis.

STEINBRUCK.—At Carthage, O., Dec. 7, 1908, in the 64th year of his age, Morton Smallie Steinbruck. He served more than three years in Co. L, 16th Pa. Cav. His second wife survives him.

HACKETT.—At Franklinville, N. Y., Nov. 12, 1908, George S. Hackett. He was born in Ischua, N. Y., Feb. 20, 1847; enlisted Dec. 22, 1863, in Co. B, 2d N. Y. M. T. C. He served two years and one month in the war against rebellion, and was mustered out of service with rank of Sergeant.
