

WOOLSEY MINING DISTRICT.

At a meeting of the quartz miners of Big Bug and vicinity, held on Friday, September 30, John Roberts, Esq., was called to the chair and James O. Robertson elected Secretary. A new mining district was formed, and the following by-laws were adopted:

SECTION 1. This district shall be known as the Woolsey Quartz Mining District, and shall be bounded as follows, to-wit: Commencing on the Agua Fria at the north-east corner of the Turkey Creek Quartz Mining District, thence following said boundary on the northern side to the high point of rocks at the head of Lynx, Big Bug, Turkey and Hassayampa Creeks, and from thence down the dividing ridge between the waters of Lynx and Big Bug creeks, and along said ridge until it makes down into the valley at or near the sink of Lynx creek, and from thence north-east to the main Agua Fria, thence down said stream to the place of beginning.

2. This district shall have a Recorder, who shall be elected by the quartz miners of this district, and whose term of office shall be for one year from his election and qualification.

3. It shall be the duty of the Recorder to keep in a suitable book a full and true record of all notices of claims brought to him for that purpose recording the same in order of their date. To record all transfers, bills of sale, mortgages, conveyances, and deeds; and to keep on file all original papers in his office until called for by the proper owners.

4. It shall be the duty of the Recorder to keep the books of his office open at all times for the inspection of the public. He shall have the power to appoint a deputy, who shall have full power to act in his stead, and also for whose official acts the Recorder shall be responsible.

5. All examinations of the records must be made in the presence of the Recorder or his deputy.

6. The Recorder shall provide at his own expense all books necessary for the recording of claims, transfers or deeds, and for issuing certificates of title, and turn the same over to his successor in office free of charge.

7. The Recorder shall be entitled to certain fees, to-wit: For each claim recorded he shall receive one dollar. For transfer of deeds, or bills of sale, one dollar and fifty cents. For each certificate of title, fifty cents.

8. Each claim shall consist of two hundred feet on a level, including all dips, spurs, angles and variations, with fifty feet of ground on each side the ledge or lode, and following all the dips, spurs and angles, with all the mineral contained therein.

9. All persons locating ledges of quartz or other rock for mineral purposes in this district shall be required to post a notice in a conspicuous place at the beginning of the ground claimed, setting forth the direction claimed as nearly as possible, also the number of claims and the names of the claimants, and the total amount claimed. The locators are required to post notices and erect monuments at the two extreme ends of the amount claimed.

10. All persons locating claims will be required to certify to the Recorder that each claim has been duly located according to the laws of this district.

11. All claims must be recorded within thirty days after location, or such claims shall be declared abandoned.

12. No person will be entitled to hold by location more than one claim on the same ledge or lode, except the discoverer, who shall be entitled to one additional claim for the discovery.

13. For all claims located after the first day of October, 1864, each company locating ground together will be required to sink a shaft to the depth of ten feet, and of sufficient width to describe the size of the ledge. Said shaft must be sunk within sixty days after location of the claim.

14. After the labor prescribed in the foregoing section shall have been performed the claimants of the ledge on which such labor has been done may demand of the Recorder (after his knowledge of the fact) a certificate of title, which certificate shall give a title for six months from date of labor performed. If after the expiration of six months operations are not commenced within thirty days said claim shall be declared abandoned.

15. All claims must be numbered from the discovery claim, in whichever direction they may lay from the discovery.

16. All claims that may have been located within the boundaries of this district before the formation of this district shall be subject to these laws, and all labor that may have been performed previous to that time shall be credited to the parties who performed such labor.

17. Any citizen of Arizona shall be entitled to hold mining ground within this district by location, subject to the laws of the district.

18. An election shall be held on the first Saturday in October in each year, for the purpose of electing a Recorder. The election shall be held within this district, to be designated by notices posted by the Recorder ten days previous to the election.

19. All persons owning mining ground in this district shall be entitled to a vote.

20. A miners' meeting may be called at any time within this district, by posting notices in three of the most conspicuous places in the district ten days previous to the time for which the meeting is called, signed by ten quartz miners of

this district, stating the object for which the meeting is called, and the place designated for holding the same.

21. The above by-laws to remain in force until repealed or altered by a two-third vote at a regular meeting of quartz miners of this district, called for that purpose.

22. These laws shall be in force from and after their passage and adoption.
