

LOCAL NEWS.

FROM WALNUT GROVE.—Steve Stephenson and others were in town from the Grove the past week. Steve told us that everything was progressing in that locality. The ground has been wet to plough, and that branch of the farming business was scarcely yet commenced, although a little ploughing has already been done. Mr. Cullumber and wife arrived home from California on last Sunday night. The Indians have been quiet of late.

CONCENTRATORS.—Owing to the recent success of Mr. Reed in working Sterling sulphurets, the abandoned old crones of which this society is composed, are just now as full of hope as an egg in a nest. Should their dazzling dreams of future wealth be realized, Cornides will have to take a back seat and go slow, as, in that case, they threaten severe retaliation upon the tillers of the soil. We used to be a member in good standing of the Concentrators, and consequently, an ardent admirer of big croppings, nice case-work, rich specimens, and dividends, but, on account of our locating a type-metal lode, and taking a young lady, the old crew-hairs of the society have, we understand, read us out of their noble circle, and of course we are down upon them.

FROM THE LOWER AGUA FRIA.—Messrs. Daniel Clark, I. Q. Dickason, Theodore W. Boggs, and Jerry Doolan, came to town last week. Messrs. Clark and Dickason returned again early this week. Mr. Boggs, having rented his ranch, will go back again for some time. In coming up, when about six miles from the ranch of J. P. Osborn, the party saw a large band of Indians on the hills close to the road. Mr. Lount was out hunting at the time and was traveling towards the Indians, who, we believe, were trying to cut him off from the main party. But, seeing them, he was prepared for them. Mr. Dickason, thinking Mr. Lount did not see the Indians, ran towards him, in order to render him assistance, when the Indians made tracks. Mr. Lount called upon us while in town, and gave a glowing account of the Agua Fria country. He thinks it the most highly favored agricultural region in the country. The weather has been delightful so far this winter; wheat is up over the ground some 5 or 6 inches, and he says that in no country has he ever seen better looking fields of wheat. The farmers are preparing to plant a good deal of corn, and vegetables. The ranch of Mr. Dickason he thinks is the prettiest he has seen in many a day. Deer are plenty, ducks, also, are numerous, among which, he noticed several of the canvas-back kind. Thousands of quail may be seen on the river bottoms.

The largest piece found last week, weighed \$8.50. Mr. Pillow, who called into the Miner office for the papers belonging to subscribers on the gulch, on Sunday last, told us that other gulches in the vicinity prospect nearly as well as the one now being worked.

Mr. George Lount, one of the original pioneers of this section of Arizona has been working in a gulch which empties into Granite creek, nearly opposite his house, a short distance south of town, and we are informed he is making fair wages. Henry A. Bigelow was out prospecting the other day, and has informed us that he found excellent prospects.
