The fellow who says the Farmers' Alliance doesn't amount to anything as a political factor is getting difficult to find, and before long the dime museum managers will be after him to exhibit among the other freaks.

Political parties are in the minds of some people like armed revolutions; if successful they are right, if unsuccessful they are wrong.

The small fry politicians are having a good deal to say about who is to receive the Presidential nominations next year; but the big fellows, those who really control things, are keeping quiet in seven languages on that subject.

This is the season for a reduction in prices in all branches of trade in order to force business; even Chicago divorce lawyers are advertising cut prices, one fellow agreeing to furnish divorces for \$24, and allowing that to be paid in instalments.

General Mahone is credited with having said recently that he was in favor of any ism that would "bust" the democracy. Judging from the elections in Virginia for several years past Mahoneism has proven unequal to the task.

New York city boys have always been considered tough, but the one through which 2,500 volts of electricity passed for five minutes, without injuring him, is certainly the toughest on record.

Ohio Republicans probably breathe freer since ex-Congressman Grosvenor went to Europe. "Keep Grosvenor in Europe until after the election; if the appropriation doesn't hold out we'll furnish the money for his salary and expenses," is said to be what a prominent Ohio Republican telegraphed to Secretary Foster.

The New York Sun credits the Ohio Republicans with being willing to sacrifice Senator Sherman to appease the Farmers' Alliance of that state. But the indications are that Senator Sherman will show the same unwillingness to walk the plank that was exhibited by his late colleague, Mr. Ingalls, of Kansas.

This year there were nineteen lieutenants in the army to be filled by appointments from civil life, and of the nineteen selected for examination six are the sons of army officers. It should be remembered that these appointments are entirely outside of the graduates of West Point, where many sons of army officers are every year appointed.

During the present year many disastrous failures among the national banks in various sections have done much to bring discredit upon the system, which has been by its friends claimed to be well nigh perfect. The majority of these failures have been caused by downright thieving on the part of bank officials, and in more than one case it is charged that the government bank examiners have either connived at crookedness or been grudgingly negligent.

It is, however, about as poorly printed a report as ever came from any Arizona printing office—and there has been some pretty tough specimens of the "art preservative" in the various territorial reports.

Washington Letter.

WASHINGTON, June 29, 1891. (From our Regular Correspondent.)

Mr. Harrison has been quite busy since his return to the White House Tuesday, and to-day presided over a lengthy Cabinet meeting, at which financial matters were the principal subject of consideration. Very little has so far leaked out, but it is probable that the course of the administration during the fiscal year beginning July 1 was mapped out, and a sort of general agreement made as to ways and means of making both ends meet and making as creditable a financial showing as possible in the Presidential year. Neither Mr. Harrison nor his advisers are idiots, therefore the Democrat who thinks his party can get an issue out of the condition of the United States Treasury next year is doomed to disappointment.

An interesting report has been made to the secretary of the interior regarding the condition and the cheapest and best means of preserving the Casa Grande ruins in Arizona. The report was made by Cosmos Mindeleff, and is quite voluminous, being accompanied with maps of the immediate vicinity of the ruins. Mr. Mindeleff has also taken a series of photographs of these ruins. His report will be incorporated in that of the secretary of the interior and the next congress will be asked for an appropriation to preserve the historic monuments.—Prospector.

When ex-Chief Justice Wright appeared before Justice Andrews, on Monday morning, to give an account of his actions on Saturday night, and answer to a charge of carrying concealed weapons, he pleaded guilty to the charge, and appealed to the judge for clemency on account of the position previously occupied by him.

A party of prospectors from the southern part of the territory, attracted by the Journal-Miner's recent article in reference to the new mineral discovery near the Grand Canyon, north of Prescott Junction, arrived at the latter place Sunday evening. They were shown specimens of ore from the new discovery by Z. T. Phillips, one of the locators, and were well pleased with the appearance, and left yesterday for National Canyon. Several prospectors have gone into this new district recently. Messrs Phillips and Healey, the original discoverers and locators of the mineral, have sent a small force of men out to the canyon to develop their properties.—Journal-Miner.

Dunby & Wallis will ship tomorrow from Pantano the last 900 head of cattle of the 3,000 purchased this season on the Babacouari and San Pedro. This last lot was purchased of Herrera, Roberts & Robbins. The shippers get a rate to Reno, Nevada, of \$88 per car which is way below any previous rate established. The reason for this figure is that cattle are scarce in Nevada and in order to restock the depleted ranges a low rate of transportation must be made. The S. P. Co. will bring the same cattle back to the California market when fit for beef and will not therefore make as bad a break in shipping prices as it would seem.—Prospector.

Forty-four stars, emblematic of forty-four states, will shine on our flag July 4, 1891. Will Arizona add her brightness to that flag before another year has come and gone? We rather think not, as it now looks as though the almost universal thirst for statehood has gone glimmering for a few years at least. This change in sentiment is most marked in Tucson and it is believed that a careful canvass of county would find the people mostly of that way of thinking. The coming constitutional convention will have much to do with the matter. If the constitution to be submitted to the people be approved by them a strong appeal for admission as a state will

The local Federation of Labor is not satisfied with the answer made by the commandant of the Washington Navy Yard to its charge that he had employed two Swedes as machinists in violation of the alien contract labor law, and it has requested Secretary Foster to order an investigation. At the Farmers' Alliance headquarters in this city they will give no official information as to what the Alliance is doing or proposes to do in the Ohio campaign; but it seems to be the general opinion that it will make a fight against the re-election of Senator Sherman, whether it takes any part in the gubernatorial campaign or not. There are hints that it may put up a full state ticket.

AN IMPORTANT BILL.

The Royal Baking Powder Contemned the New York Legislature.

Last Monday Mr. Kelly introduced the following bill in the assembly. A careful reading will show that it is a very important one: AN ACT to prevent the use of poisonous and injurious ingredients in baking powders.

Section 1—Every can or package of baking powder containing ammonia offered for sale in this State shall have a conspicuous label thereon with the words "Contains Ammonia" printed thereon in plain type, not smaller than great primer and any person who shall sell, or have or offer for sale, any such can or package of baking powder with out such label thereon, shall be guilty of misdemeanor.

Section 2—This act shall take effect July 1, 1891.
