 FLAGSTAFF, Dec. 4.—This locality has had a bountiful rain, accompanied by snow, which still continues. The Oriental restaurant, J. W. Spafford, proprietor, has closed. Mr. S. intends to engage in other business.

Shooting at Flagstaff.
 Intelligence has just been received of a shooting affray at Flagstaff. Henry Taggart, better known as "Cherokee," shot and mortally wounded John Connors, better known

as John Burke. The men had been drinking, and Connors was scuffling with another man and ran against Taggart, who stepped outside and told Connors to come out. The latter went out, when Taggart shot him, the ball entering the left side of the stomach, ranging to the right, and coming nearly to the surface on the right side of the spine. Dr. Brannen extracted the ball, but says the man cannot live. The wildest excitement prevails, and lynching is loudly talked of on the streets.

Court Expenses in Mohave County.

The Journal recently published an item stating that the last term of court at Mineral Park cost Mohave county \$5,000. Mr. H. Backsbaum, clerk of the Board of Supervisors, writes to correct the statement, and says "the cost of the last term of court at Mineral Park, including fees of justice court, sheriff, district attorney, clerk of court, juries, board for prisoners and jailer's salary, was \$2,864.65."

"For the April term of court, the cost was, including officers' fees, as above stated, \$2,018.44, making our total costs for courts, justice and district courts, and all costs contingent thereto, from January 1st, 1883, to date, at the sum of \$4,883.09; some \$116 less than your informant has charged us for our last term."


