STOCK NOTES.

Grass is growing rapidly.
Cattlemen are feeling good at their prospects.

There are now 10,000 head of stock in quarantine at Chicago.
Cattle never looked better and a large calf crop is looked for.

Dr. H. W. Purdy has been appointed quarantine officer at Nogales.
Pleurisy-pneumonia is increasing in the east but there is none in Arizona.

The refrigerating establishment at El Paso promises to be a success, so far.

Plenty of rain is reported to have fallen in the southern part of the territory.

There has been a heavy rainfall on the Colorado ranges during the past ten days.

Mc. Gillan will not be suppressed. He still persists in advocating his great stockgrowers combination scheme.

The Marquis de Mores great national butcher shop plan is abandoned. Couldn't raise the necessary funds.

The Chihuahua Cattle company is vigorously prosecuting a handful of soldiers for killing cattle on the range.

T. T. D. Anderson has been appointed agent of the bureau of animal industry in place of the late S. P. Cunningham.

Out of twenty-five head of cattle killed in one lot at Chicago last week fourteen are said to have been affected with pleuro pneumonia.

It is said that 1000 Polled Angus cattle well bred, well protected and taken care of, will pay better than five thousand head that are neglected.

The Rawlins Tribune says: "The next time you hear a wily haired freight conductor talk about the dead cattle lying along the track, brain him on the spot."

All the plans suggested to beat the dressed beef monopoly by opposition monopoly schemes have failed. They must be met and fought on legitimate business principles.

The Swan Land and Cattle company, of Wyoming, an English company with an authorized capital of \$4,000,000 have just declared a loss on their past year's operation of \$13,000.

It is reported that Clay Mana, of Colorado, Texas, who bought 360,000 acres of grazing land in Chihuahua about eighteen months ago has sold the tract at an advance of 100 per cent.

F. A. Doane, of Shenandoah, Ia., had a load of 1,536 lb. steers at Chicago on Thursday of last week that showed the remarkable gain of 450 lbs. per head within the last five months.

A small town in Ohio tried to boycott Armour & Co. from shipping meat there. He immediately started a butcher shop and sold meat four cents a pound cheaper. Mr. Armour soon stopped the boycott.

The calf crop throughout New Mexico promises to be a large one. The present excellent condition of the range and cow stock assures to the cattle men one of the largest percentages of increase to their herds for years.

Phil Armour is reported as having said recently that he believed in competition and that he does not want to be known as a cold blooded grasping monopolist in the general meaning of the word. How does the closing up of the butcher shops at Akron, Ohio, because they would not buy his meat, agree with this?

There must be some tall liars up in Montana. Some of the stock growers declare the loss this winter to have been 75 per cent. on stock, others as solemnly assert that the loss is too trivial to be worth any consideration.

The probabilities are that each man speaks from his own personal losses. With some of the small cattle men who have sheltered ranges the loss has not been very heavy, while with larger companies on exposed ranges it has been large.

The Herefords are taking the lead this year in all parts of the range country and the demand in the south-west particularly will in the future run to those animals which have a preponderance of Hereford blood in their veins. The Hereford is shown that he has all the essential elements in his make-up for the profitable improvement of the range herds.

Our stockmen are realizing the fact that improved steers sell more readily and at better prices than the produce of Texas cow and low grade steers.

St. Joseph, Missouri, is to have new and extensive stock yards, \$400,000 to be expended on them in the next three months. There will be four acres of pens under cover, and thirty-six acres of open pens. The total capacity of the pens will be 400 car loads of cattle and 250 car loads of hogs. The yards will be so arranged and tracks (of which there will be two miles within the yards) laid so that cars can be unloaded into any pen. There will be room for 100 cars on the tracks at one time.

The Larime Boomerang remarks: "The tenderfoot cowboy crop is already ripening. In another month this harbinger of spring will be numerously infest Cheyenne and other Wyoming cities in search of the summer engagement in which he expects to be compelled to kill at least a couple of the citizens." Fortunately this

specimen of the "genus homo" is not common in our part of the country. It is too long a journey for him to reach Arizona.

Information from Tucson states that last week four mounted Mexicans took in the ranch of Mr. W. H. Wheaton, at San Pedro, robbed him, and afterwards whipped him to make him reveal the whereabouts of other money. They left him bound hand and foot in the house, and then rode away. Wheaton loosened himself, rode sixty miles, and described some of the money, which was marked. Yesterday a Mexican paid a fine of \$100 for another Mexican, which was discovered to be the identical money taken from Wheaton the night previous. Sheriff Shubell took a posse to the haunt of the gang, surprised them and had them jailed before daylight. This is believed to be the gang of Mexican horse thieves who had been robbing extensively in this section during the last three months.

HORSE TALK.
A violent form of distemper is raging among the horses in Montgomery county, Ill.

Sulphur and sweet oil mixed in a thin salve is said to be an excellent salve for wounds and scratches.

Raising mules in this country would be a profitable business. There is a steady market for them in southern California at paying prices.

A horse fourteen hands and two inches high, named Pegasus, cleared a seven-foot bar in a fifty-foot diameter ring at Dalston, England, March 4th.

"Lucky" Baldwin has "laid down" and refuses to make good his offer to run Volante against Mr. A. J. Casser's Bard, one mile and a half for \$10,000.

A hard collar is not as hard upon the shoulders of a horse as one that is unevenly padded. Boils and bruises are the results of bad collars, and can be prevented by removing the cause.

The latest equine wonder is a black gelding called Jungo, that is reported to have trotted a mile on ice at Saratoga Springs, N. Y., last winter in 2:13, while his record on the turf is only 2:36.

There is a strange mortality among the choice horses in Kentucky. On March 23 a broad mare belonging to Hon. James H. Mulligan, by War Dance, and in fact to Leonatus, died. Five thousand dollars had been received for her. In King Ban, Herr Wilkes and the War Dance mare, \$50,000 worth of horse flesh was lost.

Instances of mares breeding to old age are reported as follows: "The successful and splendidly constituted hackney stallion, Denmark, was foaled in the 25th year of his dam's age and with Denmark at her foot, she obtained first prize in 1862 at the great Yorkshire show. In Lord Ross, a stud she the thoroughbred mares Euphorbia, now in her 25 year and Feronix now in her 19th year produced foals, the former in 1835 and the latter in 1836.—North-Western Live Stock Journal.

Wool Insulators Protest.
An important meeting of prominent wool dealers of San Francisco was held on the 18th inst. John H. Wise, of Christy and Wise announced that the chief subject of consideration before the meeting was that the railroad managers at the 1st meeting at Chicago, had established a rate of \$3.70 to Boston and New York, as against 65 1/2 cents under the rates in vogue prior to the inter-state act. He pointed out that the market for California wool was from March to July, before the Western wool was marketed. On the estimated total wool clip of the State of 35,000,000 pounds, the increase of freight represented a loss to the California producers of \$1,050,000. The case was one where both the producer and the consumer would be the losers and the railroad companies alone be the gainers. Mr. Wise said he had talked with the Southern Pacific people regarding this, and they informed him that whatever action was taken by the wool trade would be seconded by the company.—Sagebrush Stockman.
