STOCK NOTES.

Ranchers along the Verde say that
the recent rains have made pasturage
fine for stock.

The assessed value of stock in Tex-
as shows up thus: Horses and mules,
1,193,522 head; value \$32,221,771;
cattle, 6,741,964 head, value \$48,735,-
614. The decrease in value of cattle
from last year is about \$6,000,000.

Stock has been going down from
the mountains for several days to the
winter ranges until milk for our coffee
is out of the question. So we have
to come down to drinking our coffee
clear, and strong, as during the days
of 1861 to 1865.

Mr. William Lockstone, who quite
recently came here from Junction
City, Kansas is now down about Phenix
City, reports the weather beautiful and
the cattle, horses and mules looking
fine all along his route from Prescott
to Phenix. He is more than delighted
with lower Arizona as a winter home
compared with Kansas.

The last report of the Receiver of
the United States Land Office at Tac-
son, southern district of Arizona,
shows that 82,000 acres were filed up
on during the last three months,
50,000 under the desert act. Forty-
two thousand dollars were received as
fees for the same time. Yuma county
takes the lead in the land entries.

Eighty thousand beavers per week
is about what the packers have been
getting away with for some time, and
if any body can tell where meat has
been retailed much cheaper than it
was when the producer got twice as
much for his cattle as he has this
summer, we'll admit that there's a
ghost of a chance that the meat men
are not making from ten to twenty
eight dollars on every steer they
slaughter.

In some counties of California a
license is required to be taken out for
the "raising, grazing, and herding of
sheep." In Mono county the license
is for 5,000 or more, \$250 for the first
5,000 and for every additional 1,000
\$50; 4,000 sheep and less than 5,000,
\$200; 3,000 sheep and less than 4,000,
\$150; 2,000 and less than 3,000,
\$100; 1,500 and less than 2,000,
\$75; 1,000 and less than 1,500, \$50;
less than 1,000, \$25. Recently a per-
son refused to pay the license on the
ground that it was unconstitutional,
but the supreme court of the State has
decided in favor of the law.

The racing season is now over in
the east. As usual, the Dwyers lead
the list of winners. Their gains in
purses and stakes will probably aggre-
gate \$160,000. Of this sum \$70,000
was won by Hanover alone. Paul
Dwyer seldom bets more than \$500
a race, but Mike is a pinger, and
report has it that he is \$600,000 loser
against the books. Even if he is, he
can stand it, for he is immensely
wealthy, and this is the first season he
has not won in the books as much as
he did on the track. The Higgins,
father and son, are the next large
winners, and after the comes Lucky
Bidwell, and then Colonel Morris-
sey, of Colorado, whose winnings foot
up \$36,000. Then Hon. William L.
Scott, who has probably made his
largest expenses this year, as his win-
nings probably aggregate \$25,000.
But for the sickness of the Bird Mr.
Cassatt would have done even better
than this. Racing horses is an expen-
sive business if you don't win fre-
quently. Very few who follow the
races for a living have found this a
profitable season. There has been too
much in and out running, and those
who have bet much on public fairs
have fared as badly as those who
gamble on "sure things," "clinch-
ers," and "straight tips."—Denver
Field and Farm.

Going to Law.
A correspondent with not a little
intelligence writes this for the Indi-
ana Farmer: I never sued but once,
I sued him for \$19.60. It was
a just debt and he acknowledged that
it was; but he said he wouldn't pay it
unless he had to, and I proceeded to
"had to" him. The case was tried
before a justice and I gained it; he
appealed to the circuit courts, and the
case was kept there 18 months before
it came to trial, and of course I was
losing time right along, going to the
county seat every court term with the
only result that my opponent would
succeed in having the case continued;
I gained the case in the circuit court
and he appealed to the State appel-
late court. Then we compromised,
each paying half the court costs, and
each his attorney's fees. We were
each out of pocket nearly \$125 dol-
lars besides our time, and I hadn't
succeeded in making the fellow pay
the debt either.

Perhaps you think I haven't as
much coblativeness as I ought to
have. Well I haven't so much that I
try to butt down a stone-horse; and
going to law is very much like that.
The bull that tried to butt the loco-
motive off the track had combative-
ness enough to go to law and stay
there; and the result in one case is
very much as it is in the other. I will
frankly acknowledge that I will allow
a man to impose on me somewhat be-
fore I will incur the law's vexatious
delays and outrageous costs. I would
rather give the lawyers \$20 to collect
that amount from a man who justly
owed it and refused to pay, than to
allow the scamp to have the money;
but when I must give the lawyers one
hundred to get twenty, and very like-
ly not get the twenty, I beg to be ex-
cused. I am not combative enough
for that. True again you may say that
if no one would go to law to collect
just debt, or to obtain a redress of
wrongs, bad men would defraud or
hurt at pleasure all of which is true.
I don't say that I will never go to law
again, but I will think mighty hard
about it before I do. I don't want to see
bad men have things their own way
and I am willing to do my part in
maintaining the morality and general
honesty of the world. But to do this
by going to law is so vexatious and
costly that my solemn duty lies toward
the court-room before I retain a
lawyer.

I am not prejudiced against the law-
yers. I don't blame them much. They
must make their living of the people
who want to go to law; but it is my
private opinion that they make nine-
tenths of their living of blessed fools
who have no more business to go to
law than a mule has to try to teach
divinity. Some men are not happy
unless they have a law suit on hand,
and invariably they die as poor as Job's
gobbler is reputed to have been. * * *
Occasionally going to law is justifi-
cable indeed, not to seek legal redress
would not be less criminal. But four
fifths of the law suits would better
never have been. Usually going to
law is a game at which both players
are losers.
Don't rush to the lawyer at once,
you are mad now; sit down and think
the matter over carefully, things may
look differently to-morrow. If men
would only wait 24 hours longer,
many law suits would never be begun.
I believe that before any man begins
a suit he should hold his head under
the pump spout for ten minutes and
have an energetic person to pump.
A respectable percentage of the law
suits would be avoided if the lawyer
were more frequently consulted.
Many men who desire to do a piece
of business legally, fail to do so be-
cause they are ignorant of the law and
a false economy prevents them from
consulting a lawyer. In the writing of
deeds, mortgages, wills, etc., a lawyer
should always have a part, and a law-
yer should draw every lease of real
estate. In the settling up of estates
a lawyer should be retained as an ad-
visor, at least; and no real property
should be purchased until the title
has been examined by a competent
lawyer. If lawyers got more \$5 fees
they would get very few \$50 ones.
