This is exclusive of Board of Trade transactions, of which I haven't the figures, but presume they would add many millions. It was a pretty good year for hogs, and we just naturally slaughtered about 1,381,000 of them. Cattle you know, have been plenty, and it is safe to say that we killed \$25,700 of them. Sheep have also been plentiful; of them we slew about 118,000. Here is a table of the chief items of the rest of the business:

### Valuable Horses Sold for Duty.

Mr. J. Cohnfeld, the New York feather merchant, who owned Maxey Cobb, record 2:13 1/4, and several other fast horses, has lately been having considerable business trouble which prompted him to leave for Canada for a while. A recent dispatch from Ottawa, Ontario, reads as follows: 'It appears that Isidor Cohnfeld, the new addition to Canada's population, who has been here in connection with the seizure of horses for alleged fraudulent entry at the custom house, is the same gentleman whose departure from New York recently was pretty freely chronicled by the Canadian and American press. When Cohnfeld left New York he came to Canada determined to do things in grand style. He selected Toronto as his place of abode, and in addition to his \$100,000 worth of bonds, he brought along a magnificent pair of pacers, two fine buggies, and beautiful harnesses and trappings, the horses, carriages and outfit being valued at some thousands of dollars. A smart custom officer at Toronto, who knew something of Cohnfeld's sporting antecedents, was dubious about the value placed on the horses—viz \$2500—and after working quietly to make sure of his ground, determined to have the animals and carriages seized for violation of the customs laws. Cohnfeld arrived here yesterday morning and spent the day in trying to explain matters to the department. A decision will be rendered in a day or two.'

### Another "Horse Story."

The following is given on the authority of a dispatch from Sioux Falls, Dakota: 'The biggest authenticated blizzard story of the season comes from Aurora county. When the great storm of January 12th swept over the county, Eric Johnson, a farmer near Piankinton, was watering his cattle some distance from his buildings. He used his utmost exertions to drive the cattle home, but without avail, as very shortly they, as well as himself, were exhausted. Among the drove of cattle was a very large ox, which soon became bewildered and laid down to die close to where Johnson was foundering in the snow. At this moment Johnson, who was making frantic efforts to save himself, was seized with an inspiration which impelled him to quickly kill the ox, disembowel him, and crawl inside. After drawing the sides of the stomach together he was completely sheltered from the terrific storm by the warm carcass of the ox, and passed the night in safety and comparative comfort. When morning dawned, however, and he endeavored to crawl out of his peculiar habitation, he discovered to his horror that the ox was frozen solid, his knife outside, and himself a secure prisoner.
