STOCK NOTES.

News of interest to cattlemen Taken From Exchanges.

The calf crop was never as great for the number of cows in Wyoming as this year.

The republicans of the First Illinois District nominated Colonel Abner Taylor, a member of the well known Texas cattle syndicate for Congress.

P. P. Dags, who raises more wool than any other man in Arizona, was in Prescott during the present week, wearing the prosperous air that belongs to a man whose wool clip of the past season netted him \$40,000—Hoof and Horn.

Eastern butchers are carefully figuring on the feasibility of pooling their orders in train load lots and sending direct to the ranges for beef the coming fall. Come right along, gentlemen, our lard strings are out and we will treat you well.

The manifest disposition on the part of the owners of the million and a half small western ranches to breed up in size is an encouraging feature of the business. Large, educated horses are always saleable, while the small, wild ones are hardly worth paying taxes on.

Fort Collins (Col.) Courier: A worm, said by some to be the army worm, is attacking and destroying alfalfa in this valley. Ex-Senator Rhodes has just 120 acres, Frank C. Routt, about 25 acres, and J. C. Brown, about 25 acres. It is also working upon corn, peas and other green stuff.

Wm. A. Doble, father of Budd Doble whose name is familiar one wherever the trotter is known, is now seventy-six years old, and is as lively as most men at sixty.

At the opening of the Suffolk Park races at Philadelphia recently, Mr. Doble was present and enjoyed the sport. He has driven horses in races until the present season.

By a dispatch from Stewart, Col., we see that a gang of cowboys took possession of the town a few days ago, fired over a hundred shots, and pretty nearly demoralized the postoffice of the place. What the postoffice had done to the boys we are not informed. Probably it failed to produce a letter from their respective girls upon their return from the roundup, as they had figured on.

One of the interesting and novel features of a new packing house now building in Chicago, will be the use of the ammonia compression chills, which manufacture 125 tons of ice a day. These machines will cost \$20,000 alone. They will bring down the temperature in the chilling rooms below zero. The capacity for storing on the premises will be 25,000 barrels. All the slaughtering, will, of course, be done right on the premises.

A recent cablegram from London says: The great ten mile race between cowboys from the wide wild west of the United States, members of Buffalo Bill's company, riding their bronchos against Englishmen on English horses, took place today. The cowboys came out first, winning in twenty-one minutes. The event has long been looked forward to with great and general interest, and the contest must have been witnessed by fully 20,000 people.

Major J. W. Donnelly, of the Atlantic and Pacific land office, who has just returned from Arizona and who was accompanied by J. C. Hill, manager of Stephen and Dorsey's Colfax county ranch, states that he sold to Mr. Dorsey a tract of about 20,000 acres, which will be used for a breeding ranch. Mr. Hill remained in Arizona, visiting the different valleys, and will probably purchase considerable land for small herders of cattle who are now located in Colfax county. The present purchase of land was made in the Hualapai valley, near Kingman, and is a fine tract of grass growing land.—Albuquerque Citizen.

A stock company to be organized under the laws of the territory of New Mexico, in which parties named Hammond, Baker and Dane, is reported to have in contemplation the establishing of an immense ranch in New Mexico on a capital stock of \$10,000,000, which will control some 250,000 head of cattle. One hundred thousand acres of land and 40,000 head of cattle have been purchased in the southwestern part of the territory from Doc. Bolton, of Texas, and negotiations are about completed for the procurement of other large tracts of lands surrounding that already secured. The association is known as the New York and New Mexico Meat Company.—El Paso Tribune.

An extraordinary turf accident is reported by mail from New Zealand. At the Sandon hack meet-up, at the town of Palmerston, one of the horses fell, and all the

six animals following were likewise brought, one after the other, down on top of him. The result was that riders and horses lay writhing in a heap, and terrible injuries were inflicted on all the jockeys. The race, of course, was never finished, and when the riders were extricated from the struggling mass they were nearly all insensible from broken arms, legs and ribs. One jockey named McKenzie died shortly after the affair, and it will be a long time before the others are restored.

Cattlemen should not quite yet be too much elated over the recent advance made in the price of fat cattle in the eastern markets. This is but an indication of a better day for the cattle producer. Some very decided charges must yet occur before the product of the range producer of beef will be favorably affected. The demand for our steer product will undoubtedly be good during the coming fall months, for such portions of it as are fit for the feeder's use. Grass cattle, it must be remembered, are not yet in such scanty numbers that we can expect much appreciation of values in this class. The tendencies, however, for a much better future for the cattle raisers are now in the right direction. Those who have held on the past year or two can surely stick to the business until marked improvement comes as the industry of cattle raising everywhere will be a most profitable one. That time is surely coming.—Stock Grower.

Journalistic Charities. The life of a journalist is a hard one, and although it is not so trying as the life of a newspaper man, it is full of trials and perplexities. If newspaper men and journalists did not stand by each other I do not know what joy they would have. Kindness for each other, gentleness and generosity, even in their rivalry, characterize the conduct of a large number of them.

I shall never forget my first opportunity to do a kind act for a fellow newspaper man, nor with what pleasure I availed myself of it, though he was my rival, especially in the publication of large and spirited equestrian hand bills and posters. He also printed a rival paper and assailed me most bitterly from time to time. His name was Lorenzo Dow Pease, and we had carried on an acrimonious warfare for two years. He had said that I was a reformed protectionist and that I had left a neglected wife in every state in the Union. I had stated that he would give better

satisfaction if he would wear his brains breaded. Then he had said something else that was personal and it had gone on for some time. We devoted 15 minutes each day to the management of our respective papers, and the balance of the day to doing each other up in a way to please our subscribers. One evening Lorenzo Dow Pease came into my office and said he wanted to see me personally. I said that would suit me exactly, and that if he had asked me in another way I did not know how I could have arranged it. He said he meant that he would like to see me by myself. I therefore discharged the force, turned out the dog, and we had the office to ourselves. I could see that he was in trouble, for every little while he would brush away a tear in an underhanded kind of way and swallow a large, imaginary mass of something. I asked Lorenzo why he looked so depressed and he said: "William, I have come here for a favor." He always said I have come for he was a self made man and hadn't done a very good job either. "I have come here for a favor. I wrote a reply to your venomous attack of today and I expected to publish it tomorrow in my paper, but, to tell you the truth we are out of paper. At least, we have a few bundles at the freight office, but they have taken to sending it C. O. D., and I haven't the means just at hand to take it out. Now, as a brother in the great and glorious order of journalism, would it be too much for you to loan me a couple of bundles to do me till I get my pay for some equestrian bills struck off Friday, and it is just as good as wheat?"

"How long would a couple of bundles last you?" I asked, as I looked out of the window and wondered if he would reveal his circulation. "Five issues and a little over," he said, filling his pipe from a small box on his desk. "But you could cut off your exchanges and it would last longer," I remarked. "Yes, but only for one additional issue. I am very anxious to appear to-morrow, because my subscribers will be looking for a reply to what you said about me this morning. You stated that I was a 'journalistic bacteria, looking for something to infect,' and while I did not come here to get you to retract, I would like it as a favor if you would loan me enough white paper to set myself straight before my subscribers." "Well, why don't you go and tell them about it? It wouldn't take long." I said in a jocular way, slapping Lorenzo on the back but he did not laugh. I then told him that we only had paper enough to last us until our next bill came but that if he would write a caustic reply to my editorial I would print it for him. He caught me in his arms and then for a moment his head was pillowed on my breast. Then he sat down and wrote the following card: Editor of the Boomerang: Will you allow me through your columns to state that in your issue of yesterday you did me a great injustice by referring to me as a 'journalistic bacteria, looking for something to infect,' also as a 'top-eared germ of contagion,' and warning people to vaccinate in order to prevent my spread? I denounce the whole article as a malicious falsehood, and state that if you will only give me a chance I will fight you on sight. All I ask is that you wait until I can overtake you, and I am able and willing to knock great chunks off the universe with you.
