Hits of Information.

Kansas has had fourteen cyclones
in six years.

Idaho Territory has 7,000,000
acres of forest.

There's a crackle made partly of

Three thousand new apartmen-
t-houses have been built in New York
city within a year.

An average crop of wheat in the
United Kingdom is about seventy-
five million bushels.

It is thought by many that 2,000-
000 bales of cotton, worth \$80,000,
000 will be raised in Texas this year.

The world's coinage for 1888 was
£38,500,529, or \$292,253,615,
against £56,728,933 or \$283,612,
000 in 1887.

Ready-made underclothing can be
bought to-day for about the price of
making up the goods twenty years
ago.

Japan covers an area of 157,000
square miles; not quite as large as
California. It has a population of
38,900,000.

Indiana has a law which prohibits
the manufacture and sale of any
vinegar not the product of pure
apple juice.

The chief print from which nitrate
of soda is obtained is in Chile. There
is an export duty on it of
\$10 per ton.

It is said that during the last ten
years Americans have contributed
\$20,000,000 to relieve suffering
caused by disasters or epidemics.

More divorces are granted in the
United States than in all Europe
in 1888 the American divorces
numbered 25,535; the European,
22,080.

According to the St. Louis Re-
public there are 6,900,000 acres of
unimproved out of a total of
7,440,000 acres in the southwestern
corner of the state.

The largest crane in the world is
at the Cathryn, Eagle, Dock
Yard. It lifts 240 tons, stands 125
feet high and has a radius of seventy-
five feet eight inches.

New York now manufactures an
imitation of every mineral water of
any merit, and these are bottled,
labeled and sent out as if coming
from the different springs.

The salt deposits of Kansas extend
over an area of about two hundred
miles by seventy, and are probably
the largest in the world, being over
three hundred feet thick.

Benjamin D. Siliman says there
were only 495 lawyers in New York
city when he began his practice
sixty years ago, but that the New
York bar is now adorned with 5575
members.

Out of a total of 1,258 deaths
from accident for the year ending
July 2d in New York city only five
were caused by electric light wires,
while fourteen were caused by illu-
minating gas.

In twelve cases out of twenty-two
of impotence in the last three years
experts in chiropathy have gone
dead wrong in their deductions,
there are a hundred men in every
State who write precisely the same
hand.

Next to England little Holland is
the greatest colonial power in the
world. The Dutch colonies have an
area of nearly eight hundred thou-
sand square miles, which includes
some of the finest possessions in the
world.

Although the star-spangled banner
was established by resolution of Con-
gress 14th of July, 1777, it was not
until fifty-one years later that the
present method of signifying the
number of States by the number of
stars was adopted.

Pennsylvania last year marketed
100,000 tons of anthracite coal.
Unless Mother Earth has a spacious
supply in her stomach, this mining
for coal, pumping for oil and tubing
for gas will in time produce more or
less of an aching void.

South Africa may yet rival our
own great West in its gold product.
In 1885 its export of gold was val-
ued at \$317,600; two years later
the value had arisen to \$1,180,000.
Last year it was nearly four times
as large, amounting to \$4,531,000.

Till the Sixteenth century alcohol

was used only as a medicine. It
is as a drug that it became known
as aqua vitae, from its great restora-
tive powers. In 1581 it was first
introduced as part of the food allow-
ance of the English army in the
Netherlands.

We read about 1,000,000 bushels
of wheat, but few people realize
what a vast amount it is. But if
61,000,000 bushels of wheat were
loaded on freight cars, 500 bushels
to the car, it would fill a train fif-
teen miles long. If transported by
wagons the line of teams would be
142 miles long.

A Tough Way to Sell Cattle.

Not many people realize just how
good a bunch of cattle is required
to be to bring a price up to \$4 per
cwt. in any of the wholesale mar-
kets of the country; but when \$4.25
@ 140 means something finely bred
and exceptionally good, \$4 means
something strictly choice. When
the highest price for ripe heaves was
\$6.50 the farmer whose stock
brought \$6 felt that it was receiving
high recognition in point of merit;
but with the cream of current offer,
in a command only \$4.25 it is diffi-
cult to convince any one that \$4 is
only within the reach of strictly
fine cattle. Under existing circum-
stances it seems to the producer
that there really is no premium
worth speaking of in quality. The
range on common to choice cattle is
rarely over \$4 to \$7 per cwt.,
and is probably as narrow as has
ever been known. There is but a
single step between grades which
are normally far apart. Feeders
and shippers feel the force of this
most keenly, while salesmen are
able to obtain more reasur-
ing results. The cattle trade is,
in many respects, as unsatisfactory
now to the classes named, as it has
been at any time since the great
depression began.—National Stock-
man.

Grass Springs say that a "ghost
dance" in which all the tribes took
part, all dressed in white and which
lasted five days and nights, was had
last week and it took about all the
dance out of the Indians. The Piutes
are responsible for the gathering of
the various tribes at Grass Springs.
The medicine men of that tribe say
that the Great Spirit told them to
gather all the good Indians at that
place and that some time during two
months the Hlios would be totally
wiped from the face of the earth by
a pestilence and they would
become possessors of all the land
again. These medicine men keep
apart from the rest of the Indians
and claims to be in direct commu-
nication with the Great Spirit and have
a great influence over all those as-
sembled. It is probable that if the
prophecy of the medicine men prove
false that the Piute tribe will shoot
a couple of the wise men of their
tribe at the end of the second moon.
They are getting short of provisions
and a number of deaths have oc-
curred from lack of food, and if the
foolishness lasts the time allotted,
the number of good Indians will be
largely increased.—Miner
