THE Democratic Territorial Convention will meet at Phoenix on September 15th. It will be composed of 76 delegates.

The board of Territorial Loan Commissioners will meet at Phoenix on the 18th of August. The governor, auditor and secretary constitute the board. The funding bill provides for funding all the territorial, county, municipal and school districts debts with twenty year bonds at a rate of interest not to exceed 5 per cent per annum.

WM CHRISTY chairman of the Territorial Republican Central Committee, has issued a call for a Territorial convention, to convene in the city of Phoenix, August 26th. Representation in the convention of the several counties will be as follows, Apache, 7; Cochise, 18; Graham, 7; Gila, 5; Mohave, 5; Maricopa, 19; Pinal, 16; Yuma, 4; Yavapai, 25. Total 114.

THE candidates for Delegate are now rapidly developing. To the names already mentioned, the Florence Enterprise adds that of Hon. A. J. Doran, of Florence. A good man and a staunch Republican. The list so far as I can recall names on the Republican side is as follows, William O. O'Neill, of Yavapai. George W. Cheney of Cochise. William Herring of Cochise. Judge Nichols, of Cochise. Tom J. Butler of Yavapai. A. J. Doran of Pinal. Quite a list and a good one from which to select.—Phoenix Republican.

Railroad News

The following item is taken from the Phoenix Republican of the 24th: In a letter addressed to Governor Wolfley, D. M. Riordan, Superintendent of the Arizona Lumber Company of Flagstaff and Manager of the Central Arizona Railroad, writes that, unless the most positive assurances fail, construction on his railroad will recommence before long and that work will thereafter be pushed until Phoenix is reached, which he hopes will be before snow flies.

This will be joyful news for Phoenix. The road is the old "Mineral Belt," was originally projected to run to Globe, and

may now mean to run to that place as well as to Phoenix.

It is now extended about 35 miles south of Flagstaff into the midst of a rich timber district, from which are obtained most of the logs that are sawed into lumber near Flagstaff. The line is determined upon as far as the foot of the Mogollons, coming by way of Payson and Pine, down the rim to East Verde. From there a number of routes have been surveyed, but it is not known which has been or will be fixed upon as preferable. One way is down the East Verde to the Verde river far above McDowell. Another hugs the westward side of Mazatzal and strikes the Verde at McDowell, another runs down Wild Ry and Tonto creeks and from the mouth of the Flatter stream turns down the Salt river to Tempe and Phoenix.

The line to Globe would strike off to the left of the mouth of Tonto creek and run up the Salt river to Pinal creek, thence up that canyon to Globe, or else up the Pinto creek and over the ridge beyond Wheatfields.

THE fact is noted that many southern cities are shown by the recent census to have made wonderful growth within ten years past. Memphis has grown from 43,000 to 75,000, Nashville from 43,000 to 72,000, Dallas from 10,000 to 39,000, Chattanooga from 13,000 to 45,000, Birmingham from 3,000 to 26,000, Fort Worth from 6,000 to 31,000, and Houston from 16,000 to 32,000 and Atlanta from 37,000 to 65,000.

THE next legislature should make some provisions whereby school districts might be bonded for the purpose of erecting school buildings. Surely it is unjust to throw all the cost of construction upon the persons living in the district at the time the building is put up. Those who come later, in this rapidly developing country, should be also taxed for the erection of schools.—Phoenix Republican.
