**TERRITORIAL NEWS.**

Items of Interest Concerning Arizona and New Mexico.

It is estimated that between 60,000 and 75,000 head of cattle have been shipped out Apache, Mohave and Yavapai counties. The average prices were \$17 to \$20 per head.

Wm Cook Scott, who is introducing the Walseley sheep shearing machine in America, will have one of his plants in operation at the Albuquerque fair. Sheep owners will take interest in inspecting this machine.

The Star says the assessed valuation of Pima county this year will be about \$4,000,000. Cattle have been valued at \$7.50 per head, saddle horses at \$25, mares and colts at \$19, sheep \$1.

A militia company is being organized at Tombstone. Forty-eight members have already signed the roll, and officers elected as follows: Captain, H. S. Ford; First Lieutenant, T. Monier; Second Lieutenant, George W. Cheyney.

The assessment roll of Pinal county for the present year presents the following totals: Personal property, \$713,391.20; real estate, \$789,457.17; improvements \$247,895.63; town lots, \$59,558.75; improvements on same, \$81,664. Total, \$1,973,986.75. The increase of values over last year approximates \$200,000.

A deed from the Atlantic & Pacific Railroad company, date June 30, 1890, to Austin W. and William W. Mitchell of Cadihue, Mich., composing the firm of Mitchell Bros., has been received for recording by Probate Court Clerk Harris, of Bernalillo county. The deeds call for 314,668.37 acres of timber land in Bernalillo and Valencia counties, and the consideration is \$629,446.64.—Stock Grower.

Clerk Sweeney made another try yesterday at selling the delinquent property on tax roll of district No 1. He got past the letter "C" with no buyers and knocked the price down to the Territory. The delinquent taxes foot up over \$4,300, of which amount over \$2,000 are set against the Southern Pacific and Maricopa and Phenix railroads, who are contesting in the courts payment of the tax.—Arizona Republican.

C. D. Gardiner, an extensive sheep buyer from Fremont Neb., has just concluded the shipment of 800 head of sheep from Winslow and arrived in the city last night. G. L. Brooks placed the sheep for the gentleman. A train of thirteen cars of sheep, belonging to Mr. Gardiner, came in this morning over the Atlantic & Pacific, but owing to enormous freight rates on the Santa Fe, the sheep will be driven through the country.—Albuquerque Citizen.

D. M. Ferry, the famous seaman of Detroit, and C. C. Brown have made a proposition to build canals on the south side of the Salt river at Phenix, to build a new dam across the river and to consolidate the heads of all the canals on that side. The plan is to locate the dam above that of the Arizona canal, which feeds all the canals on the north side, being a short distance below the Verde river. Here two points of red sandstone projects into the river, where a dam 50 feet long and 40 feet high is to be built. Hence the canal is to lead the water directly at a right angle through a rock bank. The canal will be 50 feet wide at the bottom, 6 feet deep and carry 50,000 miners' inches of water. The rock cut will be two miles long and 36 feet deep at places. The undertaking will be one of the largest in the valley and will cost more than \$500,000. The canal will furnish great water power. There will be one drop of 14 feet to the Highland canal, another of about 20 feet to the Mesa canal, one of 15 feet to the Utah canal, and a magnificent fall of 30 feet over which to carry the 9,000 inches of the Tempe canal.—Albuquerque Citizen.

Remember that the present charter of The Louisiana State Lottery Company, which the Supreme Court of the U. S. has decided to be a Contract with the State of Louisiana and part of the Constitution of the State does not expire until the First of January 1895. The Legislature of Louisiana, which adjourned on the 10th of July of this year, has ordered an amendment to the Constitution of the State to be submitted to the People at an election in 1892, which will carry the charter of The Louisiana State Lottery

Company up to the year Nineteen Hundred and Nineteen.
