DEATH OF C. E. HAPAL

Typhoid Suddenly Carries Away One of Hilo's Best Young Men.

Charles Edward Hapal died last Saturday morning at the Hilo hospital after a short siege with the dread malady typhoid fever. His sickness dated from the encampment of Company D two weeks before, where he contracted a cold which passed through the stages of lagrippe and malaria, developing into typhoid. He had been in the hospital but two days and for more than twenty-four hours before his death, was unconscious.

The funeral was held Saturday afternoon from the Haili Church under the auspices of the local lodge of Foresters and Company D, H. N. G. The deceased was an active and enthusiastic member of both organizations. He was laid to rest with military honors.

At the church, the impressive service was conducted by Rev. S. L. Desha and Rev. C. W. Hill. The house was crowded with the many friends of the deceased and sympathizers with the bereaved family. The floral offerings were many and beautiful. Two selections were sung by a quartette consisting of Messrs. English and Beers, Mrs. Ross and Miss Maby. A quartette of Hawaiian ladies also sang. During the service a guard of honor stood by the bier.

The deceased, a son of Judge and Mrs. Hapal, was born in 1874 in Hilo. He was educated in the Hilo public schools and at Punahou College, graduating from the latter institution with the class of '95. He was one of the most popular of Hilo's young men and during his short career acquitted himself honorably in various positions of public trust. At the time of his death, he was Deputy Clerk of the Fourth Circuit Court and Clerk of the District Court presided over by his father. He was an active member in several local social organizations and was an enthusiastic patron of athletic sports. His loss will be distinctly felt by his former comrades as it is keenly and bitterly lamented in his home circle.

Only a few months ago the deceased was married to Miss Louise Pomeroy.

Japan Claims Ownership.

Yokohama, July 23.—It is announced that an official has left Tokyo for Marcus Island, in the Pacific ocean about 800 miles southeast of Yokohama, to establish Japan's ownership. An American schooner left Honolulu for the destination July 11.

To Redeem Old Cards.

The following is the circular received in the city:

Office of Postmaster-General, Washington, D. C., July 10, 1902. Order No. 740.

It is hereby ordered that on and after August 1, 1902, postmasters at all postoffices shall redeem, in postage stamps or other stamped paper only, and from the original purchasers, uncanceled and unserviceable postal cards, at 75 per cent. of their face value.

Parts or pieces of cards will not be redeemed; nor will cards which have been treating by bronzing, enameling or other process of coating be redeemed under the provisions of this order.

HILO TO LOSE JOHNSON.

Master of the Roderick Dhu to be Transferred to the Rosecrans.

Captain Peter Johnson, the best-known skipper on the Hilo route, is to make only one more trip as master of the bark Roderick Dhu, sailing hence for the islands. Upon his return Captain Johnson will take command of the steamer Rosecrans, recently purchased by the Matson Navigation Company from the Army transport service. He will superintend the work of remodeling the steamer into an oil carrier, and as such will command her when she is placed on the Hawaiian route, plying between here and various island ports. Although all his long experience has been gained in sailing vessels, Captain Johnson possesses the highest certificates that can be granted to masters of steamships in the United States, which fact goes to show that it is possible for a master mariner in a wind-jammer to learn a great deal about steamships without going to sea in them. As the Rosecrans will not carry passengers, his transfer from the Roderick Dhu, while looked upon as an advancement, will not be hailed with delight by the traveling public on the Hilo route. At some time or other, it is safe to say, every man, woman and child in Hilo has met Captain Johnson.

The above taken from the San Francisco Chronicle tells of a promotion which will not please the host of friends that Captain Johnson possesses in this port. Not that a single one of them does not congratulate the jolly Captain on his merited promotion, but his friends would rather have him kept on a Hilo run. For fifteen years Captain Johnson has been blowing into Hilo regularly and the fact that he is now booked to be master of ex-transport Rosecrans, causes grief among the boys who know him. With San Francisco at the other end of his run, Captain Johnson has steadfastly claimed to be a Hiloite and has been a loyal partisan in her favor.

It was the wish of his Hilo friends when the Matson line added a steamer, that he might be made master of the flagship Enterprise. But Captain Matson who doeth all things well, arranged otherwise and Hilo's favorite sea captain is slated for another port.
