THE rotten gush of some of Dole's subsidised organs over the inability of the Republicans to nominate and elect a Republican to Congress is only equalled by the stupidity of those who make the statements. Why not be honest and tell the truth about the matter? It is well known that if Dole and his clerk were out of office and out of the way, two thirds of the Hawaiians would be republicans and vote the Republican ticket. Then there would be no question as to our representative in Congress

SANFORD BE-DOLE still considers his individual signature sufficient to validate a statute and to virilize a proclamation. Even the President does not presume to issue an official document without appending to his name his exalted and legal title. If it were worth the corn, there are numerous statutes and proclamations, executed by Sanford be-dole, that would not stand the test of the courts, because improperly signed.

HONEST, fair American justice is distasteful to Governor Dole and his supporters. Both the Governor and his satellites attack at every opportunity, every ruling, proceeding, order or decision of the American judges of this Territory.

If the property owners in the line of the proposed extension of Bridge street hold up the Territory for excessive damages, they hold up the interests of Hilo and their own interest to boot.

THE latest outbreak of Kilauea was preceded by earthquakes that awakened many people in Hilo.

VOLCANO VERY ACTIVE.

Monday Night Earthquake Followed by Red Glare of Lava.

The volcano at Kilauea is in the most violent state of eruption that has occurred since 1892.

An earthquake shook Hilo last Monday night and within a few minutes thereafter a telephone message from Manager Waldron at the Volcano House, thirty miles away, stated that the pit of Halemaumau was reflecting a light plainly visible on the clouds. The message also stated that Mr. Waldron would go at once to the crater's edge three miles away and see what had happened.

Tuesday morning Mr. Waldron was able to report that he had looked into the pit and seen a boiling, tempest tossed lake of molten lava, 400 feet in diameter and probably 800 to 1000 feet below the rim of the great cauldron.

The face of the lake of liquid fire would alternately be black and white like the gushing fluid that leaps from the furnaces of a steel plant. The oxidization and cooling of the fiery fluid would blacken the surface with a pall that would clothe the vast inverted cathedral in darkest gloom. A quiver, caused by further subterranean upheavals would break this oxide into a fretwork of a thousand incandescent cracks, lighting up the smoke-charged pit with a fierce glare.

Here and there over the surface of the lake, columns of white hot lava would shoot upwards like the harmless fountains in the public gardens. The great forbidding walls of the "House of Everlasting Fire" would shimmer awhile in amazement with this unaccustomed light, and as the geysers of fire would die away, and the surface again turn black, the whole pit once more would be hidden in darkness and smoke.

All day Tuesday the same conditions prevailed. Tuesday night the light from the red hot furnace was reflected on the clouds. The same conditions held through Wednesday, and Thursday Mr. "simply magnificent." Wednesday night people living near Hilo could see the vivid reflection on the clouds.

The present upheaval of lava seems to be from the very bottom of the crater and not from a wound in the side as appeared in June. The liquid lava is troubled and convulsed as from powerful activity of forces below.

Large crowds of Hilo people will go up Sunday.

INCREASE IN SUBSIDIES.

Colonies Will Aid Great Britain in Naval Scheme.

London, Aug. 12.—While the results of the colonial conference which ended yesterday are generally considered satisfactory as far as they go, it must be understood that their enforcement depends ultimately upon action by the colonial legislatures and by the imperial Ministers whose departments they concern.

In addition to the Australian naval arrangements by which the Australian contributions are to be largely increased on condition that certain vessels be officered and manned entirely by Australasians, a general increase in colonial naval subsidies was agreed to. The scheme also provides that some colonies shall allot part of their local military forces to imperial defense in case of emergency, but Canada and Australia contented themselves with agreeing to keep their local forces in a state of efficiency, relying on volunteers in case of imperial need, as was done in South Africa. The contribution of Cape Colony to the imperial navy was fixed at \$250,000 annually and Natal at \$150,000.

The preferential tariff arrangements is in a nebulous condition, depending entirely on future arrangements between the mother country and each individual colony, the understanding being that such arrangements would follow the general line of the Canadian tariff.

The foregoing arrangements do not represent the unanimous opinion of the conference, but each resolution was adopted by a majority vote.
