MILES AT HONOLULU.

Head of U. S. Army on His Way Around the World.

Lieutenant General Nelson A. Miles arrived in Honolulu on board the transport Thomas on his way to the Philippines on a general tour of inspection of the army. Of his arrival the Advertiser says:

General Miles is in excellent health and looks better than he has for some years, so well in fact that it hardly seems possible that his retirement will take place next year. He said that he had enjoyed the trip exceedingly, as there was not an hour of bad weather during the run from San Francisco. Asked as to his plans he said: "I am making a general tour of inspection of the army. We shall stay here until noon Saturday, and then will sail for Guam and the Philippines."

"While here I expect to make a thorough inspection. Tomorrow I shall look at the sites for fortifications at Pearl Harbor, where the naval station will be placed, and as well will go to the site proposed for the permanent barracks if possible. Every minute of my time will be given to looking over the ground while here, and I consider that I shall have my hands full."

"From appearances this is a most beautiful part of the United States. The general impression I have had of the Islands is one of their great beauty and I am looking forward to further enjoyment in going about through the plantations and seeing the character of the country."

It is the intention of the party to spend from six weeks to two months in the Philippines, the journeys being so laid out that they will cover all the islands where detachments of troops are stationed. For this purpose there will be a transport placed at the disposal of the party. The return trip will be made by way of the Suez canal and the Mediterranean sea.

Gen. Miles is one of the Civil War veterans who rose to distinction from civil life, and throughout his administration he has been a consistent friend of the enlisted man. He has introduced many reforms and brought himself under strong criticism at times by his outspoken endeavor to make the army an institution of the people.

HILL ON TRUSTS.

Jim Hill Says Congress Can't Deal With Combines.

St. Paul, Sept. 27.—In an address at the Grant County Fair at Elbow Lake last evening President J. J. Hill of the Great Northern Railway and of the Northern Securities Company said:

"Your chairman said that there are a great many people apprehensive of the great industrial enterprises which are being carried on, and well they may be. There are so-called industrial enterprises whose only industry is in running printing presses to print shares of stock. Some people advocate, our President advocates, turning everything over to Congress. What sort of a Congress would we have after a while if all the business of the country were turned over to it? I think they would be doing business in the halls of Congress, but the business they would do would not bring business to you that you want. I think I should hold every man responsible for himself and his own acts. If he does wrong, punish him; if he does right, protect him. When that is done those persons will take care of themselves."

Mr. Hill told how his efforts toward reducing rates on grain had been thwarted by the consolidation of the lake boats in making a corresponding raise. "What did we do then?" asked Mr. Hill. "We built six schooners to carry grain from Superior to Buffalo and the other boats have not declared a dividend since. We did not want to go into the elevator business at Buffalo, but we had to in order to keep the other elevators from overcharging and working other extortions. As a result the elevator charges of Buffalo are now half a cent a bushel where they were 1½ cents."

ROME IN PHILIPPINES.

Archbishop Guido Will Work in Harmony With Governor Taft.

Rome, Sept. 27.—The publication of a pontifical bull on the apostolic constitution of the Philippines is imminent. It will indicate the general object and aims of Archbishop Guido's mission to Manila. The apostolic delegates will have to reorganize the whole ecclesiastical hierarchy of the archipelago.

Archbishop Guido is animated by the most liberal ideas regarding the settlement of the Philippine questions. In his letter to Governor Taft he said he was glad he had been chosen to co-operate with him in the pacification of the islands, and hoped to be able to count on his assistance.

One of the first projects of the Archbishop is the establishment at Manila of two seminaries to educate the native clergy, which are destined ultimately to replace the foreigners. These seminaries will be entrusted to a religious order which has not hitherto been represented in the archipelago.

The discussion regarding the friars, which was the subject of negotiations between the Vatican and Governor Taft, might, it is suggested be solved without recourse to the recall of the friars, "by opening the doors to the Philippines to all the clergy of all the religious orders, without distinction, of nationality, thus quickly overshadowing the few hundreds of Spanish friars remaining there."

NAVY HAS COAL.

A Large Stock Secured in Anticipation of the Strike.

Washington, Sept. 27.—There is no danger of the failure of the projected great naval maneuvers in the Caribbean sea next winter for lack of coal, thanks to the foresight of Admiral Bradford, chief of the Equipment Division. That officer long ago foresaw the possibilities of a strike, and he now is in the peculiarly comfortable position of having at command about 100,000 tons of coal distributed throughout the coaling stations and navy yards, with ironclad contracts behind him which insure the naval vessels in this country an adequate supply at all times as long as there is any to be had. Moreover, not only was the coal purchased at a low figure, ranging from \$2.50 to \$3.25 per ton, but the contract binds the coal dealers to deliver coal for the future needs of the Navy at about the same figures. These facts were developed by questions submitted by the General Board, and Admiral Bradford's assurances have given considerable satisfaction.
