### SHORT CABLEGRAMS.

Geneva, June 18.—King Peter of Serbia will start for Belgrade on Monday.

Washington, June 18.—The establishment of the Rural Delivery Service has been resumed.

Jacksonville, Ky., June 18.—The jury in the feud murder case is unable to come to an agreement.

Washington, June 18.—The President will leave for his summer home at Oyster Bay, L. I., on Saturday.

San Francisco, June 18.—An unknown lumber schooner of 600 tons has been wrecked on Marshall Island.

Manila, P. I., June 18.—Lieutenant Foley is on trial before court-martial on the charge of embezzlement.

San Francisco, June 18.—The Korea will carry the greatest flour and butter cargo ever shipped to the Orient.

Geneva, Switzerland, June 18.—The Servian escort that will accompany King Peter to Belgrade arrived today.

Waterloo, Iowa, June 19.—A railroad collision occurred here today. Nine passengers were killed in the wreck.

Greenwich Point, Conn., June 19.—The Reliance barely defeated the Constitution in the race today but badly defeated the Columbia.

San Francisco, June 18.—Attorney General Byington says that sufficient evidence has been secured to indict Eppinger & Co. for fraud.

Denver, Col., June 18.—Streams on the western slope of the Rockies have risen to a dangerous height. The Rio Grande is breaking its levees.

San Francisco, June 18.—The Coast Telephone linemen have threatened to strike if their demands for an increase of pay are rejected.

St. Petersburg, Russia, June 19.—The Russian Court has ordered a period of mourning for the death of the late King Alexander and Queen Draga of Serbia.

Heppner, Oregon, June 18.—The total number of bodies recovered is 153. Sixty transient visitors are missing. The latest estimate of the dead is 225.

Berlin, Germany, June 18.—The United States squadron will arrive at Kiel Saturday for participation in the ceremonies of the German naval maneuvers.

London, June 18.—A canvass of the House of Commons shows it to be the consensus of opinion that the government should continue in power two years longer.

St. Petersburg, Russia, June 19.—The Czar has officially recognized King Peter as the sovereign of Serbia. This action by Russia is accompanied by a clear-cut demand upon the new King that he shall punish the assassins of King Alexander.

St. Louis, Mo., June 19.—Arnold, one of the members of the John J. Ryan Turf Investment Company, surrendered himself to the police today. The Grand Jury has been investigating the affairs of this company and recently acquitted its president, Ryan, of embezzlement.

Washington, D. C., June 19.—It has been practically decided that General S. M. B. Young will be named chief of the General Staff under the new army reorganization law on the retirement of General Miles. Young will have Major General Henry C. Corbin and Brigadier General William H. Carter as his subordinates.

Washington, June 18.—Major General Frank Wheaton is dead. General Wheaton was seventy-five years of age. He was retired from the army in 1897. He served in the wars against the Indians and in the Civil war commanded a division at Gettysburg and in the Shenandoah valley campaigns. He was with the Army of the Potomac from the first battle of Bull Run to Lee's surrender. He particularly distinguished himself at the battles of the Wilderness, Cedar Creek and Petersburg.

### SPECIAL MESSAGE.

Governor Dole Objects to Methods of Law Makers.

Honolulu, June 18.—The following message from the Governor relative to the matter of referring the various items in the Loan Bill to the island delegations was read the first thing at the afternoon session of the House today:

Honolulu, H. T., June 18th, 1903. To the Speaker and members of the House of Representatives, Territory of Hawaii.

Gentlemen:—I am reliably informed that the House of Representatives, in considering appropriations under the Loan Act, have adopted a plan by which such members as have been respectively elected from those parts of the group which have been set apart as counties under the County Act, are authorized to pass the appropriations for the counties they respectively represented under the division of the Loan Act fund agreed upon for the respective counties; with the understanding and promise that such appropriations will be adopted by the House.

In relation to this proposition, I desire to call your attention to the principle of legislative responsibility, which does not permit legislators, under their oath of office, to bind themselves by any promise or understanding whereby their freedom of action in the consideration of any subject of legislation is or may be impaired. In other words, a legislator may not commit himself before his vote on any reading of a bill, so that he is not free to vote according to his best judgment at the time his vote is taken.

The duty of a legislator to the public interests of the Territory is always paramount to his responsibility toward the section which elects him.

### Important to Hawaii.

Honolulu, June 16.—Professor R. C. L. Perkins the assistant Territorial entomologist, was a passenger on the Kinaiu today for Hawaii. He was accompanied by his wife.

Professor Perkins is going to make a tour of the Hamakua coast on an entomological expedition. He will start at Paauhau plantation and visit all of the various plantations in that district. He will be absent some weeks.

Considerable interest is attached to his trip. He will make a careful study of the entomological conditions of parts of the island of Hawaii. Should he discover any new pests, steps will be taken at once to secure relief to the places affected.

### Feudists to be Given New Trial.

Jackson, Ky., June 19.—A new trial and change of venue has been ordered in the case of Tom White and Curtiss Jett on trial for the murder of Attorney Marcum. During the first trial of these men, members of the Hargis and Cardwell factions have been in the town and it has been impossible to secure competent testimony on account of the fear of witnesses for their lives. The feudists have been free with their threats and there is little doubt that further shooting would follow had prosecuting witnesses given testimony that would assure conviction.

### Refrigerating Exhibit.

The Louisiana Purchase Exposition will have a representative refrigerating exhibit. The various uses to which mercantile refrigerators are applied will be exhibited. There will be a skating rink, and at certain fixed hours during the day there will be a snowstorm.
