#### A FLOURISHING LODGE.

Brief History of Kilauea Lodge, F. and A. M. No. 330.

Kilauea Lodge No. 330, F. and A. M., has passed another milestone in its career and faces the new year in an exceptionally flourishing condition. The lodge started with fourteen charter members and now has a membership of 102.

On the evening of December 3, 1896, a meeting of Master Masons was held at the residence of Brother W. W. Goodale, at Papaikou, when it was resolved to petition the Grand Lodge of California for a dispensation to establish a Lodge here. On December 5, the second meeting was held at the same place, when a petition to the Grand Lodge was drawn and the name "Kilauea" Lodge selected. The brethren who were active in the preliminary organization and who signed the petition were: Warren Goodale, Robert B. Williams, Elmer E. Richards, O. B. Braddick, Lewis F. Turner, Wm. W. Goodale, Harold V. Patten, Robert More, William S. Bohm, John H. Maby, A. F. Linder, Philip Peck and J. C. Pope Howatt. On February 22, 1897, the third meeting was held again at the same place, and the dispensation presented, dated February 4, 1897, and on February 27, this Lodge held its first meeting under dispensation, with the following as its first officers: Robert More, W. M.; R. B. Williams, S. W.; E. E. Richards, J. W.; A. F. Linder, Treasurer; L. F. Turner, Secretary; H. V. Patten, S. D.; J. T. Moir, J. D.; Wm. W. Goodale, Marshal and Wm. S. Bohm as Tyler. Frequent meetings were held from that date until the expiration of the dispensation on October 1, 1897, during which time fourteen Master Masons were added to our rolls. On September 11, 1897, a petition for a charter was sent on to the Grand Lodge, and a charter was granted on October 15, 1897, to Robt. More as Master, R. B. Williams as Senior Warden, E. E. Richards as Junior Warden, and to their brethren to open a Lodge to be known as "Kilauea Lodge, No. 330." On February 18, 1898, Kilauea Lodge, No. 330, was constituted and dedicated under the auspices of Andrew Brown, Deputy Grand Master, assisted by Joseph M. Little as Senior Grand Warden, and Kenneth R. G. Wallace, Junior Grand Warden and Grand Secretary, and the following were elected as its first regular officers: Robert More, W. M.; R. B. Williams, S. W.; E. E. Richards, J. W.; W. W. Goodale, Treasurer; H. C. Austin, Secretary; E. Thrum, S. D.; James Webster, J. D.; S. S. Peck, Marshal; L. T. Grant, Chaplain; A. C. Steel and J. H. Bole, Stewards; and W. S. Bohm, Tyler.

Kilauea Lodge now holds \$1440 of the stock of the Masonic Hall Association, Ltd. This association now holds a lot situate on Waianuene street in Hilo with a frontage of 135 feet and a depth of 319 feet. The lot is now fully paid for at a cost of less than \$6,000, and there is over \$1000 in the hands of the treasurer. A building to cost about \$12,000 is contemplated. The Lodge is taking up each month a few shares at \$10 per share and it is the hope that the brethren will subscribe for the stock, so that the building may be under way by this time next year. The need for more extensive quarters is becoming more apparent every day. The Lodge room will accommodate about fifty, and the membership is over one hundred.

The following officers were elected at the meeting of December 5: Frank Arthur Medcalf, Master; Thomas Caldwell Ridgway, Senior Warden; William Thomas Balding, Junior Warden; Adam Lindsay, Treasurer; George Henry Vicars, Secretary. Trustees—John Troup Moir, Elmer Ellsworth Richards, Lorrin Andrews Andrews.

#### TO HELP KUHIO.

Attorney Charles Clark Has Mission to Washington.

Honolulu, H. T., December 9.—Among the passengers for the Coast in the China was Charles Clark, who was here some years ago as a practicing attorney and who, after a prolonged stay on the mainland, returned to Honolulu some months since on account of the ill health of his wife.

Mr. Clark, previous to his first trip to the Islands, spent a great part of his time in Washington in connection with the work of New Jersey Republican Senators and Representatives. He likewise represented the Pennsylvania railway in so far as New Jersey interests were concerned. For five years consecutively, Mr. Clark labored in Washington and became acquainted there with the powerful men from the various sections of the country.

It is on this account that, when here last, he was consulted by men anxious for the welfare of the country and after several conferences, it was seen that he had a firm hold on the situation. There were more conferences and it was finally decided that Mr. Clark, in furtherance of such views as those expressed by the Builders & Traders' Exchange in their memorial to Congress praying for the expenditure in the Territory of certain stipulated amounts, should be sent on to do what he could.

In accordance with this decision, Mr. Clark left in the China and is probably now in New York. His instructions were to go straight to Prince Kuhio, Hawaii's Delegate to Congress and tender him his services, to be used in whatsoever capacity the prince might see fit, every bit of the work done by Mr. Clark to be within the control of the Delegate himself. Mr. Clark took with him letters to the Prince explaining the mission and showing the bearer to be not only at the absolute disposal of the Delegate, but to be within the control of no local organization whatever.

Interested in the project are some of the members of the Builders' & Traders' Exchange, one of whom spoke as follows this morning: "The Builders & Traders' petition shows that the Federal Government gets \$1,084,889.57 income out of this country every year, this being over and above all expenses. It seemed to us that this country is not in any condition to make such a contribution without the return of some of the money. It was with this idea in mind that a petition was formulated and sent to the Delegate for presentation to Congress, asking for the expenditure of certain specified sums. While these may not be the exact amounts required, still they are approximate and could easily be changed when the bill for the appropriations is brought in.

"Mr. Clark goes forth with all the information necessary and I believe he would be a real help to Hawaii, on account of his experience, were he to be accepted by the Delegate."

Mr. Clark was up in Hilo some weeks ago and at that time made a close inspection of the site of the proposed breakwater, familiarizing himself with all the particulars in order to be able to speak convincingly in Washington.
