ANCIENT HILO JOURNAL.

Printed Pages of "The Hilo Advocate" Unearthed in a Garret.

Hiloites of to-day are wont to swell them selves with the pride of this city's modernity. Even Hilo newspapers swell up occasionally and claim credit for the down-to-date condition of affairs here, and especially to plume themselves in the belief that the journals of to-day are the pioneer representatives of Gutenberg on the Island of Hawaii. Such is not the case. Long before the Tribune or the Herald had been conceived or had gone forth like winged thought, to enlighten mankind; before the Bulletin bulletined or the Star started or the Advertiser advertised, the Hilo Advocate was booming Hilo. The number discovered in J. H. Maby's garret was issued in July 1880. Its columns reek with advertisements and "boom" stuff for Hilo. The July number was the last, the following pathetic valedictory appearing from the pen of the editor, Mr. H. Stephen Wallingford.

"And now farewell! our physical condition renders it necessary that we should at once resign the editorship of this paper and retire to private life. What small stock of brains we possessed at the start have all been consumed in the production of this number and we are left a mental bankrupt. To those of our friends, who have so kindly rendered us assistance in this, our hour of trial, we return our heartfelt thanks, and will send them a copy of the Advocate (if we do not forget it)."

The news columns bristle with the life of the 80s. We make the following extracts.

"Mr. Olsen left town yesterday for a two weeks stay in Keeau.

"Hilo was treated to a shock of earth quake on the first.

"Hilo has passed through a potatoe famine.

"Johnny Ki is building a palatial Mansion at the upper end of Church street.

"The Fourth of July celebration was the best Hilo ever had. Under the management of J. H. Maby the program was a splendid success.

"In a department which the Hilo papers of to-day might well add to their prosy columns, it is discovered that fortifications for Coconut Island were then in sight. A navy yard was also about to be established and the air was full of big things. We glean from "The Answers to Correspondents" column:

"To readers—Questions to be answered must be accompanied by a certificate of good character, signed by the King.

"Major—No, Mr. Bishop is not a graduate of West Point.

"Anxious—Yes, Diamond Head and Coconut Island will be strongly fortified.

"Kona—You're right; a World's Fair in Honolulu in 1882 would develop the resources of the Kingdom enormously.

"Konihika—This gentleman has 10,240 acres of cane land and he wants to lease it to the government.

"Kau—That's the talk.

"Enquirer—We suspect the \$10,000,000 loan originated at Kala-kaua College in the vicinity of Honolulu where political philosophy is taught.

Kino—Your reasons for a Military Academy are good, communicate with Marshal Baker at once.

"Sailor—Certainly Hilo will have a navy yard, it will be the envy of the world.

"Princess—Yes, we agree with you. If we have currency the King should have charge of the printing machine and issue the money at his own discretion, but, if we have a mint, we must have a superintendent.

"Lio—Yes, free rum is harmless. Police make people drunk and quarrelsome. Let us reform the police and let rum alone."

In the advertising columns, the Hilo Dairy sells pure milk—customers to do their own watering. Shipman & Eldarts on Bridge

street advertised fresh butter, fish and coconuts.

J. Smith was the proprietor of the Hilo Restaurant.

J. Flors another dairy man, sold two brands, fresh and pure.

J. H. Maby and W. C. Borden were the merchant princes of those days.

A slate hung up in Johnny Ki's office was the bulletin board of the town. Orders for draying were left on this slate.

Henry West was then a volcano guide instead of a statesman.

There is no evidence in this old copy of the Advocate that Loebenstein, Little, Sheriff Andrews or J. U. Smith were any where on this planet.

BOARD AND CIRCUIT COURT.

Estimates of Judge Little Are Cut by Board.

At Saturday's meeting of the Board the following communication was received from Judge Little:

"Gentlemen: I have the honor to transmit herewith an estimate of the probable expenses for my Court for the fiscal year ending February, 1895.

"The estimates have been prepared in accordance with the expenses of former terms of Court, as appears on record in our Court, and if you will permit me to say in explanation that, should any of these estimates be too high, of course the money would remain in the treasury unexpended and subject to the order of the Board of Supervisors the same as other funds.

"The experience of Courts is that you had better make the estimate high rather than too low, and inasmuch as no money can be paid out of the treasury without a proper voucher approved by the judge of the Court, whatever the estimate may be above what is actually needed will remain in the treasury.

"I further suggest that our terms of Court here fluctuate—sometimes we have a very heavy term of Court and sometimes the term is rather light, so that it is impossible to make an estimate that will exactly meet the demands of the Court.

To Ceylon by Rail.

For some years past there has been a proposal to link the island of Ceylon to the mainland of India by a railway carried across the coral reef of Adam's bridge and the island of Rameswaram; and the project has now been brought within view of completion by the report of a railway commission, which has just been issued in India, recommending the construction of a broad-gauge line. Geological evidence shows that Ceylon was originally joined to India by a continuous isthmus, which, according to the temple records of Rameswaram, was breached by a great storm in 1480. When the two countries are once more joined together by a railway bridge, and continuous intercourse is established, the present system, which makes Ceylon a crown colony, separated from our Indian empire, will seem more than ever anomalous.—London Chronicle.

Business Pressure.

All the railroads that center in Chicago have prohibited the use of liquor or tobacco by employes when on duty. Practically all the important railroads now concur in this prohibition. The Western Electric Company and numerous other great business concerns in the West forbid not only the use of liquor, but of cigarettes, and the habit, now grown to an almost incredible extent among all classes of the community, of "playing the races." Business reasons thus make necessary the control or avoidance of habits against which moral reasons are too often helpless.—Everybody's.
