HOLIDAY RACES.

Gentlemen's Races and Baseball at Hoolulu Park Monday.

Next Monday is Washington's birthday and will be a general holiday. There will be good racing at Hoolulu Park. The chief attraction will be a gentlemen's riding race. The horses are the favorites of the Hilo track, and the riders while not of jockey weight are even enough in avoidance to guarantee each horse a fair show. In this race Chr. Castendyk, C. N. DEPUTY SHERIFF FETTER.

The Republican Precinct Committee Took Action Wednesday.

The Republican precinct committee met Wednesday evening and settled the matter of a Deputy Sheriff for this island by endorsing the name and application of Captain W. A. Fetter. Captain Fetter has made an excellent record as commanding officer of Company D and brings to the office of Deputy Sheriff many excellent qualities, among which is a loyal republicanism. The vote was very close between Fetter and H. S. Overend, standing 7 to 6. The other applicants for the place were H. Kendall and J. W. Moanuli. Capt. B. H. Brown had withdrawn his application. It is understood that the choice of Sheriff Andrews for deputy was J. W. Moanuli first and Captain Fetter second. The Committee also endorsed Tom Rickard for the position of captain of police in Hamakua in place of John Keliipole, the latter having taken part in opposing the Republican ticket last fall. T. M. Rowland was endorsed as a police captain in Hilo. Action on the application of B. H. Brown was deferred. The committee endorsed all the other police officers now holding office under Andrews. February Term Court.

The February term of the Fourth Circuit Court convened Wednesday at 10 o'clock. The calling of the Grand jury was deferred until Thursday awaiting the arrival of Deputy Attorney General Rawlins. Thursday morning the Grand jury was impaneled and charged and sworn, E. E. Richards being appointed foreman. Judge Little's charge was the usual formal instruction regarding the duties of Grand juries and methods of conducting their work. The trial jury was excused until Tuesday. The fishery cases were all continued to next term, Elia Naone, charged with assault with intent to commit murder, pleaded guilty to a lesser charge and was fined \$25 and costs. Default was entered in the case of I. E. Ray vs Lim Fat.
