### TO EXCLUDE JAPANESE.

#### How California Feels Toward the Japanese Invasion.

The San Francisco Evening Post editorially comments upon the danger of Japanese labor to the Pacific Coast as follows: Why does Congress make so marked a distinction between Japanese and Chinese labor? Presumably because at the time of the passage of the Chinese exclusion act the Japanese were not considered so dangerous to the interests of white American labor. Nevertheless, as time goes along the danger of Japanese labor to the Pacific Coast is becoming more and more apparent.

In the city of San Francisco alone there are many colonies of Japanese—self assertive, impudent, strong and well versed in Oriental vices. These Japanese, like their brethren in China, can live on almost nothing and can easily underbid the American workingman in the open labor market. If Japan should defeat Russia and should become a formidable world power, which at present seems likely, the Japanese will flood the Pacific Coast States and will resent any interference on the part of the United States. It is absurd to suppose that the Japanese, flushed with victory, will tolerate any Japanese exclusion act. And yet their presence in our midst is as deeply to be deplored as the presence of the Chinese, who are not one-fourth as arrogant in their demeanor toward the white man.

No matter how much we may deplore the atrocities of which the Russians have been guilty in their conduct, not only toward the Jews at Kishineff, but toward other human beings, there can be no doubt that a Japanese victory means untold trouble for the United States, and especially for the Pacific Coast. The Russo Japanese problem is a difficult problem for the United States to solve. Taking one consideration with another, however, it seems to us that there is less danger in a victory for Russia than in a victory for Japan. In spite of ourselves our sympathies may be with Japan. But our better judgment forces us to the conclusion that a victory for Russia will be the safest thing for this country.

### Object to Midnight Noise.

Complaint has been made to Sheriff Andrews of the midnight disturbances caused by the Japanese tent show on Furneaux lane near Front street. Some time ago and from time to time since the destruction of the Japanese theatre on Ponoehowai street the theatrical company have given their exhibitions in a tent at the above place. Objection was raised at that time and the Sheriff promised to heed the wishes of the citizens who live in that vicinity. The inmates of a boarding house nearby getting wind of the proposed performance on the Emperor's birthday tried to forestall the show, by filing a protest a day in advance with Sheriff Andrews. Notwithstanding this, however, the Jap performers put up their tent and Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights proceeded to make night hideous with the repetition of the fall of Port Arthur, with the accompaniment of firing of bombs and clatter of cymbals. Inquiry at the Police Station develops the fact that Capt. Rowland issued the permit for the performances.

### Sale Under Execution.

Under the writ of execution of the First Bank of Hilo, the Sheriff sold yesterday at noon the book accounts, leasehold, stock and fixtures of the Owl Drug Co. Ltd., at public auction. \$437.70 worth of book accounts were sold to N. C. Willifong for \$66. The unexpired lease was bought by W. S. Wise and the stock and fixtures were knocked down to C. C. Kennedy for \$2,060. It was understood Mr. Kennedy represented the Hilo Drug Co., who will add the stock to their store on Front street. The proceeds of the sale aggregated \$2,136.
