SENATE.—Mr. Everts introduced a bill (3601) for arrears of pension to Mrs. Mary E. Murray, wife of Col. Edward Murray, late col. 5th Regt. N. Y. Heavy Art.

Mr. Reagan introduced a bill (3602) to repeal all the laws of the U. S. providing for the retirement of officers of the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps from active service with pay.

Mr. Hoar introduced a bill (3603) granting a pension to Mary C. Winslow, only daughter of John A. Winslow, who commanded the Kearsarge in the fight with the Alabama.

Mr. Sherman introduced a bill (3613) for the erection of additional quarters at Columbus Barracks, Ohio.

Mr. Blodgett introduced a bill (3614) to increase the efficiency of the Insp. Gen.'s Office.

Mr. Hearst introduced a bill (3628) to provide for a subsistent in the Army.

Mr. Allen introduced a bill (3629) granting to the State of Wash. a section of public land for a soldiers' home and for the militia.

Mr. Hawley favorably reported the bill (H. R. 445) for the erection of a shop at the National Armory, Springfield, Mass.

Mr. Hampton adversely reported the bill (224) to place Elmer A. Smith in the Army retired list with rank and pay of 2d Lt. of mounted service. Also, the bill (265) for the relief of 1st Lt. Charles G. Ayres, 10th Cav.

Mr. Hawley reported a bill (2690) for the construction of two wagon roads through the mill reservation of Fort Canby, Wash.

Mr. Chandler, from the Com. on Naval Affairs, submitted a report to accompany the bill (728) in recognition of the merits of C. Eng. George Wallace Melville, and of the other officers and men of the Jeannette Arctic expedition, heretofore reported by him.

Mr. Dolph reported an amendment intended to be proposed to the Naval Appropriation bill.

Mr. Teller introduced a bill (3664) to compensate Isaac F. Evans for service as capt. and Q. M. in the Mont. Indian War of 1867.

HOUSE.—Mr. Breckinridge introduced a bill (9530) to make appropriation to put the mill reservation at Fort Douglas, Utah, in order.

Mr. Cutcheon reported a bill (3601) to define the standing of contract surgeons during the late war.

Mr. Osborne favorably reported the bill (4187) for the correction of the Army record of Capt. William P. Hall, U. S. A. Also, a bill (4774) authorizing the President to appoint and retire John F. Mount a capt. in the Army.

Mr. Hare introduced a bill (3616) increasing the pension of Georgianna C. Hall, dependent mother of Maj. John W. Williams, (deceased), U. S. A.

Mr. Cutcheon adversely reported the bill (7181) to fix the rank of certain Army officers.

Mr. Craig introduced a bill (9633) providing for the retirement of Army officers.

Mr. Grosvenor introduced a bill (9644) for the relief of W. H. Davis, 1st Lt. late Co. H, 25th Ohio Regt.

Mr. Reilly introduced a bill (9690) for the relief of William Winlock, late capt. Co. E, 48th Pa. Regt.

Mr. Bunn reported a bill (1047) for the relief of Capt. W. J. Kountz.

Mr. Conger introduced a bill (9681) to test the Bender propeller system.

Mr. Pennington introduced a bill (9683) to authorize a certain credit in the Army and Navy.

Mr. Outhwaite (by request) introduced a bill (9710) appropriating and assigning naval relics to the National Association of Naval Veterans.

Mr. Kelley introduced a bill (9734) to muster as 2d Lt. Joseph B. Sands.

Mr. O'Neill favorably reported the bill (9220) to preserve the grave of Maj. Gen. Arthur St. Clair and erect a monument over the same.

Mr. Smith favorably reported the bill (8182) for the relief of Sarah A. Oakes, legal heir of Capt. Hugh Warthington, deceased.

Mr. Outhwaite (by request) introduced a bill (9708) to establish naval militia training schools at the principal sea-coast and lake ports of the U. S. Also a bill (9709) appropriating prize money due to the survivors of Farragut's fleet for captures made on the Mississippi River in April, 1862.

ARMY NOTES.

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Lieut. Charles J. Bailey, 1st Art., is relieved from temporary duty with Bat. L, 1st Art., and will join his bat. at San Francisco.

The extension of leave granted Capt. G. S. Luttrell Ward, 22d Inf., is further extended 5 months.

Lieut. William B. Gordon, Ord. Dept., is ordered to appear before the board of ord. here May 13.

Lieut. Robert H. Noble, 1st Inf., is ordered to the New York recruiting office May 1 to conduct recruits to Dept. Platte.

Capt. Philip Reade, 3d Inf., Insp. of small-arms practice, is ordered to attend the encampments of the Wis. N. G. at Camp Douglas, Wis., July, 1890, and of the Mich. N. G. at Gogiac Lake, Battle Creek, Mich., July 23-28, 1890, to give instruction.

Lieut. Oskaloosa M. Smith, 22d Inf., is ordered to attend the encampments of the N. G. of Minn. in June or July next, at Lake City, Minn., to give instruction.

The Rev. Delmar R. Lowell, of Vt., and Rev. John L. Galvin, of Ohio, were last week nominated by the President to be post chaps. in the Army.

The following changes of stations of medical officers are ordered: Capt. Henry S. Kilbourne, asst. surg., from Vancouver Barracks, Wash., to Willets Point, N. Y.; Capt. William W. Gray, asst. surg., from Fort Magnums, Mont., to Fort Sherman, Idaho; Capt. John M. Baulster, asst. surg., from Fort Sherman, Idaho, to Fort Stanton, N. M.

Capt. Cyrus S. Roberts, 17th Inf., is relieved from duty in Chicago May 1, and ordered to his regt.

The following transfers are made in the 19th Inf.: 2d Lt. Frank McIntire, from Co. G to Co. E; 2d Lt. William T. Wilder, from Co. E to Co. G.

Maj. Robert H. White, surg., now on duty at Fort Meyer, Va., is ordered to West Point for temporary duty as post surg. during the absence of Maj. Henry McElherry, surg., as a member of the Army medical board.

A favorable report has been ordered by the House com. on the Wheeler bill to define the line of the Army and increase its efficiency.

The bill provides that the line of the Army shall consist of 25 regts. of inf., 10 of cav., 7 of art., 1 of engs. and the officers of the Eng. Corps detailed with that regt. Regts. are to consist of 3 batts. and 12 cos. The President is authorized to consolidate the enlisted men assigned to a regt. into such numbers of cos. as can be fully officered by the number of officers usually on duty. The Cutchon bill, requiring that promotions below the grade of brig. gen. be made according to seniority, is included as an amendment to the bill.

The sentence of dismissal in the case of 1st Lt. James V. Paddock, 5th Cav., who was court-martialed at Fort Leavenworth April 3, has been remitted by the President, in consideration of his valuable services. The charges were making and causing to be presented a false and fraudulent claim against the U. S. and conduct unbecoming an officer and gentleman, (in duplicating pay accounts.)

A letter from the Sec., transmitting estimates of appropriations amounting to \$129,053, required to supply differences in the appropriation for the pay of the Army for the fiscal year 1890, was laid before the House Wednesday by Speaker Reed.

The bill placing Gen. John C. Frémont on the retired list with the rank of maj. gen. is approved by the President.

Reports received at the War Dept. during the past 9 months show that there have been 1,578 desertions from the Army in that time. For the corresponding months of the previous year there were 1,893 desertions, a reduction this year of over 16 per cent. The percentage of desertions to the enlisted strength of the Army has been for this period 6.1-10 per cent., and for the same period last year it was 7.6-10 per cent.

Capt. Joseph H. Dorst, 4th Cav., is relieved from duty at West Point, and ordered to his co.

Gen. A. W. Greely, Chief Signal Officer, leaves in a few days on an extensive tour of inspection among the signal stations in Ariz., Col., Utah, and Neb.

Col. Alfred L. Hough, 9th Inf., is retired on account of age.

Capt. William Krause, 3d Inf., is retired on account of disability.

Lawrence Long, Shelbyville, Ky., and J. J. McCanna, Flatbush, N. Y., are appointed cadets at West Point.

At West Point the graduating exercises will probably take place on the 10th or 17th of June, when 55 cadets will very likely graduate. At present there are 22 vacancies in the Army to be filled by appointment from this class. The pending legislation to increase the art. of the service from 5 to 7 regts., if it become a law, will provide a number of additional places.

The following nominations were sent to the Senate by the President last week: Lt. Col. Charles G. Bartlett, 1st Inf., col. 9th Inf.; Maj. James S. Casey, 17th Inf., lt. col. 1st Inf.; Capt. Harry C. Egbert, 12th Inf., maj. 17th Inf.; 1st Lt. A. G. Tassin, 12th Inf., capt.; 2d Lt. Charles H. Barth, 12th Inf., 1st lt.; 2d Lt. Thomas H. Rees, Corps Engrs., 1st lt.

The court-martial in the case of Lt. S. Allen Dyer, 23d Inf., formerly of this city, who was charged with cowardice and fraud in incurring debts, has resulted in a verdict at Buffalo, N. Y., that practically acquits him. He is, however, found guilty of carelessness in financial matters, by which he has brought discredit upon himself and the Army, and for which he is sentenced to be confined to the limits of his post for one year.

A general court-martial is appointed to meet to-morrow at Jefferson Barracks, Mo., and will consist of the following officers: Capt. George D. Wallace, 7th Cav.; Capt. Stanton A. Mason, 4th Cav.; 1st Lt. Levi P. Hunt, 10th Cav.; 1st Lt. George H. Sands, 6th Cav.; 1st Lt. John H. Gardner, 9th Cav.; 2d Lt. George W. Goode, 1st Cav., and 2d Lt. Farrand Sayre, 8th Cav. Capt. Henry B. Osgood, com. of sub., judge advocate.

The general court-martial convened at Willett's Point, N. Y. Harbor, Nov. 2, 1889, is dissolved.

Capt. Selden A. Day, 5th Art., is granted 10 days' leave May 1.

Capt. Joseph H. Dorst, 4th Cav., is granted 1 year's leave, with permission to go abroad.

The general court-martial convened at Jefferson Barracks, Mo., Oct. 17, 1889, is dissolved.

Lieut. Joseph E. Maxfield, Sig. Corps, is granted 2 months' leave July 1, with permission to apply for an extension of 2 months.

Second Lieut. B. M. Purcell, Sig. Corps, is ordered to examination for retirement.

Adj. Gen. Kelton has almost recovered from his recent illness, and contemplates a short trip along the Atlantic Coast.

THE NAVY AND MARINE CORPS.

On the 9th of May the Simpson Dry Dock at New York Navy Yard will be formally opened. The contractors propose to take over many naval officers and others from Washington.

The two 8-inch guns have been placed on board the Baltimore, and the other two will very likely be put on in New York.

Comdr. P. F. Harrington is ordered to duty as asst. to the Insp. of the 4th Light-House Dist., May 1, and as Insp. in charge of dist., May 31, relieving Comdr. John P. Reed, who is detached May 31, and placed on waiting orders.

The Essex was put in commission last Tuesday, and will probably sail shortly to join the South Atlantic Squadron.

Lieut. Comdr. W. H. Brownson is ordered to examination for promotion.

Ensign Guy Brown is detached from the Iroquois, and ordered to the coast survey steamer McArthur.

Ensign W. W. Gilmer is detached from the Iroquois, and ordered to the Fish Commission steamer Albatross.

The Squadron of Evolution was prevented from entering Piraeus because an epidemic of "eulogia," a disease resembling typhoid fever, is prevalent. The squadron proceeded to Malta.

The acceptance of the new dynamite cruiser Vesuvius, a question that has been open for many months, is once more the subject of discussion between the Sec., his law advisers, and the builders of the boat. The contractors insist that all the requirements of the contract have been complied with, and ask that the vessel be accepted without further delay. But the

Sec. is not satisfied with the horse-power developed, and is anxious the vessel should be given another trial to test this point. It is thought that there will be another trial.

The Sec. has decided not to allow the Marine Band to accompany the Md. Society of the Army and Navy of the Confederate States to Richmond, May 29, on the occasion of the unveiling of the Lee Monument. This decision is made on account of the band being required to perform here May 30, in connection with the Decoration Day ceremonies.

Ensign Gilbert Wilkes has resigned from the Navy, to take effect Feb. 10, 1891, and he has been granted leave until that date.

Asst. Eng. C. H. Matthews is detached from the Mare Island Navy Yard, and placed on waiting orders.

Capt. J. A. Henriques, Capt. George W. Moore, and Lt. Charles F. Shoemaker, of the revenue marine service, are appointed a board to meet to-morrow at the Treasury Dept. for the examination of 3d lts. for promotion in that service.

Lieut. George H. Gooding, revenue marine, now on waiting orders at Portsmouth, Va., is ordered to the steamer Crawford, at Baltimore, relieving Lt. W. C. De Hart, who is ordered to the steamer Fessenden, at Detroit, Mich.

The Philadelphia, now at Cramp's ship yard, Philadelphia, is practically completed, and will be given a preliminary trial trip some time this week.

A bill was reported in the House on Wednesday by Mr. De Haven, from the Naval Com., to relieve the Union Iron Works of San Francisco from a penalty of \$83,384, exacted by the Government for failure to reach the required horse power in the construction of the Charleston. The passage of the bill is urged on the ground that while the horse power developed is less than was expected the speed is greater.

Civil Eng. George Mack is ordered to duty in the Bureau of Yards and Docks.

Paym. J. F. Tarbell is granted 1 year's leave June 1, with permission to go abroad.

The Richmond arrived at La Plata and the Talapoosa at Rosau, Uruguay, Monday.

The Jamestown will remain at the Norfolk Navy Yard until June, when she leaves for Europe on a summer cruise.

Lieut. James N. Allison, 2d Cav., is ordered to Jefferson Barracks, Mo.

Surg. H. M. Martin, who was detached from the Asiatic Station March last, has reported his return home, and is placed on sick leave.

The Baltimore left the Norfolk Navy Yard Friday morning for a trip at sea.

Ensign A. C. Almy is detached from the receiving-ship Independence, and ordered to the Thetis, relieving Ensign John J. Blandin, who is detached and ordered to the Bureau of Equipment and Recruiting.

A meeting of the American Society of Naval Engrs. was held last Wednesday night for the election of officers for the ensuing year. The following were chosen: President, Chief Eng. N. P. Towne, re-elected; Sec. and Treas., Asst. Eng. W. M. McFarland, to succeed P. A. Eng. R. S. Griffin, resigned; Members of the Council, P. A. Eng. G. W. Baird, P. A. Eng. J. H. Perry, and Asst. Eng. Emil Theiss. The report of the retiring sec. and treas. was read, and showed the society to be in a flourishing condition, and a vote of thanks was passed to him.

Med. Dir. T. Woolverton is detached from duty at the Washington Yard and placed on waiting orders.

The orders of Lt. Walker McLean are revoked, and he is ordered to temporary duty at the naval ord. proving ground, Annapolis.

A circular is issued by the Sec. announcing that both the 5,500-ton and 8,100-ton cruisers recently advertised for must be completed by Jan. 1, 1893.
